

Parting Letter From Bishop Grant

A few reflections arising from being 'priest in charge'

I thought I had written my last Ascent article - but then the staff realized that Fr. Jonathan would (not “wouldn’t”, but “would”) return to work close to the day that this Ascent was due to be printed...so I get one more chance to say a few words. It was also suggested to me (by whom I am not at liberty to say) that I’m in a unique position to say a few words that might be more difficult to say by someone remaining on paid staff. Well, that is an intriguing (and dangerous) invitation.



Before I say anything else, I want to say “thank you” for giving me the opportunity to help the Church of the Ascension over the last few months. I can’t thank everyone personally. One thing I have noticed is just how many people do so many things to make sure that this community of Christians is a healthy place. Obviously, the staff come to mind first. They are hard-working and devout. This is a great combination - they love God and they love the people of Ascension. They love the people who have been here for decades - and the people who just walked through the door yesterday. I’m impressed with their dedication. But of course, they get paid - but many of you volunteer in countless ways, working quietly and carefully. Paul in his letters has several lists of spiritual gifts (see Ephesians 4, Romans 12, 1 Corinthians 12). His lists are not exhaustive. They include leadership-type gifts (pastors, teachers, etc.), gifts which are of the miraculous kind (healing, tongues, and so on), and “ordinary”, everyday gifts (like serving and administration). I’ve seen all these kinds of gifts exercised at Ascension over the last months. It is wonderful to watch the body of Christ in this place functioning in such a healthy way. Thank you for all that you do to put love of God and love of neighbor into practice here. And thanks for letting me be a part of this great place.

Ascension has obvious strengths. But every strength that an individual or a Christian community has carries with it an inherent danger. Being good at something or valuing something (or someone) highly should always make us reflect on whether we actually value that thing or person *too* highly. The danger, of course, is called idolatry...

Does Ascension have an idolatry problem? Well, I don’t think so. But, human beings are inherently worshiping beings - so it is always worth wondering where we are putting our hearts, where we are putting our treasure (see Matthew 6.21).

So what does Ascension value most? Is there a danger that what we value highly at Ascension could become idols? Let me mention just two things that are highly valued here.

First Ascension values beauty. So do I. Ascension is extremely careful to present its worship in an aesthetically attractive way. The music is carefully planned and offered. It is done as well as our gifted musicians can present it. The building (beautiful in itself) is kept neat and clean. The work of artists is encouraged. The budget for the building and for the music is fairly substantial - it needs to be if we are to keep up the standard that is expected in this place. Such a ministry, which may look like it is money spent on ourselves, does not mean that Ascension neglects reaching out - in fact, the beauty of the building, the music, and the worship does actually make Ascension a place that attracts people.

But the very beauty of this place means that we as a body need to be vigilant against the danger of doing things because they are beautiful, rather than because we are making an offering of the best that we have to God. Believe me, I speak from experience! Cathedrals (and Ascension is kind of Cathedral-like) often (often!) have fallen into the trap of valuing aesthetics over true spirituality. I am not saying that Ascension is doing this - not at all. I am saying that this incredible strength carries with it a danger, a temptation. We are called to “worship the Lord in the beauty of holiness” (Psalm 96.9) - not the holiness of beauty. We also need to pay attention to the budget - is money spent on beauty in proportion to money spent on ministering to a lost world outside of our doors?

Second, Ascension also considers itself a welcoming community. Now ‘welcoming’ is a difficult thing to assess. I am sure that we have not done all that we can to be welcoming. We try, but we may miss opportunities. I’m sure some have come to Ascension and not been welcomed. But if I can brag on Ascension one more time - this congregation tries really hard to welcome people ... short of making ourselves annoying, clinging, stalkers, of course. But welcome in itself (this may sound weird) can have an idolatrous edge. In Ephesians 4.15 Paul speaks of “speaking the truth in love.” This may be one of the hardest things Paul ever wrote - or at least hard for our culture to hear. For us in the western world in the 21st century, love and truth are hard to reconcile. We think of love as “acceptance” of people “the way they are.” We think of differences of opinion as things to avoid, things which put a strain on relationships. Some even think of any criticism as “hating.” Ascension works hard to make sure that everyone who walks through the door feels that they are welcome. But in the Christian life, not every thought is equal. In the church of God, not every action, or every lifestyle is acceptable. Long ago I heard that the job of the preacher is to comfort the afflicted - and afflict the comfortable. That doesn’t mean that the job of the priest - or any other follower of Jesus - is to go out of our way to find fault and condemn others. Far from it! But the Christian life involves growth into the image of Christ (Romans 8.29). It means that our thoughts and actions are not to be shaped by this world, but are to be transformed by the Spirit (Romans 12.1-2). This means there should be no talk in the church of “my truth.” This means that not every spiritual practice is acceptable just because it is “spiritual.” This means that not every sexual practice can be blessed. It also means that not every political opinion is equally valid: there is a long tradition of Christian political thought, a long tradition of thinking about how Christians relate to the world - and some of what passes for “Christian” views of politics these days (on both sides of the aisle) does not measure up to the church’s wisdom. Perhaps rightly, Ascensionites are hesitant to express partisan political views. Such views might give rise to conflict, and conflict does not make for a very welcoming atmosphere. Yes...but. Truth and love must not be divorced. In our welcoming of one another, let us not neglect the importance of public truth. And in our pursuit of truth let us not forget to love one another.

Well, that’s enough. The issues I’ve raised are not simple ones and both boldness and wisdom are needed to negotiate these paths. May God continue to give Church of the Ascension the good will, the energy, the creativity to minister in a complex world that is so in need of God’s love in Jesus.





Evangelism Cohort Beginning Fall 2018

First Session:

Sunday, September 23 after the 11am service

One of the church's core commitments is to evangelize, to share the good news of Jesus Christ's victory over sin, death, and the devil with those who have not heard it. The church is sustained by the message that Christ has delivered us from powers of this world that keep us from fulfilling the vocation we have to devote ourselves fully to God and to be priests to and stewards of the vocation. He has delivered us from the grip of the fear of death (Heb 2:14-15).

He has fulfilled the law of God and has become the perfect sacrifice for sin (Matt 5:17-20; Heb 10:14), offering vicariously for us what we were supposed to offer to God but in our weakness and sinfulness could not. In other words, by the power of the divine life within Him, Christ shows us what true humanity looks like. But he does not just do all this on our behalf or in our place: he invites us to be united to him and participate in this work with him. The Son of Man came to seek and to save the lost (19:10, cf. 4:16-20), and the church participates in the mission of God to redeem the lost by proclaiming Christ and enacting justice and righteousness in our communities (Matt 25; 28:18-20; Gal 6:10; Jas 1:27).

Evangelism in word and deed is the calling of every Christian, not just those who are gifted to be evangelists (Eph 4:11). But evangelism has become controversial and neglected in the past century, and many of us have little to no background or practice in doing it. Even those of us who want tell others about Christ may be intimidated by evangelism. We may not know where to begin. We may be worried about proselytizing (the Catholic Church helpfully distinguishes between evangelization and proselytizing by defining proselytizing as "the promotion of a religion by using means, and motives, contrary to the spirit of the Gospel; that is, which do not safeguard the freedom and dignity of the human person" *Doctrinal Note on Some Aspects of Evangelization*, n. 49).

I would like to propose that we make a new start in our evangelization by doing it together. As Christians we are members one of another (Rom 12:5), and we can help each other to become intentional in our evangelistic relationships with non-Christians by meeting together and praying together for one another, for the mission of the whole one, holy, catholic, and apostolic church, and for the non-Christians in our relational circles. We can encourage one another with testimonies about the conversations the Lord has permitted us to have with non-Christians and will enable us to pray for each other and for the non-Christians in our circles whom we are seeking to evangelize.

I want to invite anyone who is interested to join me once a quarter to talk about our evangelization of our neighbors, to encourage one another, and to pray for one another. Our first meeting will be on Sunday, September 23 after the 11am service. We can grab snacks and coffee from the parish hall and then gather in the Hunt Rooms. I hope you will join me!



What is the vision for Community Groups at Ascension?

The vision for Community Groups at Ascension comes from the description of the early church's practice in Acts 2:42-7. The church devoted itself to four core practices: devotion to the apostle's teaching, fellowship, sharing meals, and prayer. As we know from the rest of Acts, these core practices formed the community for the sake of bearing witness to Christ in word and deed to Jerusalem, Judea, Samaria, and 'the ends of the earth'.

The New Testament is clear that this commission is not issued to solitary disciples, but to the body of Christ, the people that God is forming for himself. The Bible affirms the dignity, the worth, and the freedom of the individual, but it repudiates individualism. Individualism, which can be summarized as a belief in personal autonomy and self-creation, is at odds with the biblical conviction that "we are individually members of one another" (Rom. 12:5). As the biblical scholar Craig Bartholomew argues, "we need a spirituality that will undermine western individualism." In addition to corporate worship every Sunday, our Community Groups are the chief way that we express our conviction that we are a body and not isolated individuals with private relationships to Christ.

Our Community Groups bear these commitments and practices out in different ways. Some groups meet every week, others meet every other week. Some share a meal at every meeting, others elect to do so on special occasions. All of our groups are open to participation by anyone, but they differ in the degree of commitment that they require. Some groups are open and flexible in terms of participation. Some groups, which we call Rule of Life Community Groups, require a greater degree of commitment. The Community of St. Barnabas, for instance, abides by a communal rule adapted from the Rule of St. Benedict for lay use and asks for a year-long commitment from members. At the heart of all of our groups, however, is the commitment to form disciples into the body of Christ through the core practices of the faith for the sake of the mission of the gospel.

A Preference for Geographical Proximity

The long history of the church demonstrates that the practices of the church are most formative when the members of the church live close to one another and can DO life together. Another way to say this is that the more disparate and diffuse we become geographically, the less we resemble a body and the more we resemble a group of isolated individuals who happen to show up at the same place once a week.

Among secular intellectuals, there is a vast literature documenting and lamenting the 'crisis of place' that has been introduced as a result of car culture. This literature highlights the lack of flourishing that results from being constantly on the go in our cars and not deeply rooted in particular places, but also the way in which our ability to travel anywhere at any time generates an unrelenting sameness on all places. One observer calls this monochromatic pattern of building the 'geography of nowhere'.

As the church, we are not immune to this feature of American life, and we will not overcome it by challenging our members all to move within a mile of the church so as to artificially recreate the parish. At the same time, we recognize the way in which our lack of geographical proximity to each other dilutes not only the quality of our relationships but also the power of the fellowship to form us deeply into the body of Christ.

We are committed, therefore, to promoting geographic proximity in our Community Groups. If possible, we would like to encourage you to attend a group near where you live. We have groups that meet all over the city, and we are always adding more groups so that we can extend the fellowship of the body of Christ to more and more people in the city of Pittsburgh. Fall Sermon Series

The Lectionary

The Lectionary is a gift to the church and its preachers. It spares us from vanity, self-flattery, and staleness by forcing us to consider, week in and week out, the ‘whole counsel of Scripture’ (Acts 20:27).


Preachers are assigned texts to preach: we do not have the luxury of choosing comfortable passages to preach on, nor do we have the luxury of substituting passages without Episcopal permission. Moreover, if you follow the Anglican ‘rule of life’, which commends the devotional practices of joyful and attentive participation in weekly communion, the Daily Offices of Morning and Evening Prayer, and private devotions (Q. 255, *To Be a Christian*), you will read through the entirety of Scripture every year in the Daily Office Lectionary and once every three years in the Sunday Lectionary: a thorough immersion in the Bible.

Continuity of Scripture

At the same time, the Sunday Lectionary does not take us passage by passage through books of the Bible, and it gives us each week readings from the Old Testament, the Psalms, the NT Epistles, and the Gospels. Preachers may focus a sermon on any or all of these readings. For all of these reasons, it can be difficult to get a sense of the continuity of the Scriptures – to get a sense of the purpose of each book, and to get a sense of how the whole hangs together in the light of Christ – even through attentive participation on Sunday morning. For that reason, in 2018 we have been focusing our preaching consistently on one reading in the Sunday Lectionary. In most cases, this has meant that each preaching ‘series’ has been on one book of the Bible, enabling us to unpack the meaning of that specific book over a series of Sundays and to place that book in its context within the whole of Scripture.

Sunday Scriptures and Sermon Questions

Each week, our preachers will also craft a series of questions based on the reading on which they are preaching for use in Community Groups, by families and individuals. We hope that in all of those settings, you will return to the Scripture and read it again, with the second reading freshly illuminated by the preaching of the word on Sunday. These questions will be made available on Ascension’s website no later than Sunday afternoon for use during that week – just look for the Sunday in question and click on the date. These preaching series and the accompanying questions are aimed at equipping the people of God’ to pray and ‘hear...read, mark, learn, and inwardly digest’ the Scriptures so that we “may embrace and every hold fast the blessed hope of everlasting life” (Collect for the Second Sunday in Advent).

Music & Worship this fall

Prelude Music!

Even after 25 years at Ascension, I continue to marvel at the number of people who bring such a variety of musical gifts and skills to share during the time when people are gathering for worship. Bridges Not Bubbles

Bubbles inevitably pop. Bridges support transitions. I'm very thankful to be able to serve at Ascension where we have restructured to provide bridges not bubbles. Some churches neatly organize ministry so there is a 'youth pastor', a 'college pastor' and a 'young adult pastor'. While such focus can be helpful, there is also the danger that such a division offers young Christians minimal support at the precise time they face the maximum challenge; transitioning from one season of life to the next. We all know that going away to college is a massively disorientating transition, with troubling statistics like "somewhere between 60 percent and 80 percent of previously engaged Christian youth become disengaged with their faith as they transition into college," but emerging from the 'student bubble' and joining the workforce is reportedly just as challenging. One is no longer surrounded by like-minded friends but instead faces all the uphill battles of dealing with unfamiliar expectations, alien workplace culture and possibly doing so in a new city with minimal relational support.

So how does Ascension's Youth and Young Adult Ministries (affectionately known as 'yaya' for short) look to develop strong youth, college and young adult ministries, while building bridges for those transitioning from one season of life to the next? And how can you be involved? Here are just five examples:

Strategic Summers

#1

Arriving as a freshman at a new middle school or at high school can be a scary prospect - which is why rising 6th graders are invited to the middle school youth group gatherings the summer before they start at their new school, and the same for 8th graders starting at high school. When, for example, John and Joseph start at Allderdice at the end of August, they already have good relationships with juniors and seniors from youth group who can help welcome and orientate. At the same time, high school youth group graduates who are thriving as Christians at college, like Mari Gowdy, come back to help over the summer, connecting with those who have that college transition in their foreseeable future. So please do pray that these middle and high schoolers will be full of faith, hope and love as they step into their school buildings for the beginning of the new semester at the end of August. And do write letters of encouragement to Ascension's former high school students who are away now at college. Reach out to me or Leah for any contact details. Thanks!

Layered Teams

#2

Just as it has been wonderful having admirable college students working alongside the middle and high schoolers throughout the year, I am thankful that the CAYG team (Church of Ascension Youth Group) also includes those in their early and later twenties. Intentionally building teams of folks who are close enough in age to easily connect, but also a stage removed in life and career, supports ongoing discipleship for all involved. If you are in your twenties, and open to the possibility of being a significant mentor and encouragement to another who is a few years younger than you, then do contact me or Leah to find out more.



Confirmation Mentors

#3

You can read more about this wonderful opportunity for Ascension's younger teens later in this edition of the Ascent, but I would like to underline one 'bridging' aspect to our Youth Confirmation process. Over two years, and structured around monthly lunches on a Sunday, each confirmand gets to both learn and teach others. And the preparation to share at the monthly lunches happens with an assigned confirmation mentor. Each confirmand gets three mentors in sequence, each who walks alongside them for a period of four months. And the ideal is if one mentor is an 'older sibling' figure, another being the age of their parents, and another the age of their grandparents! Not only does everybody learn together, but a 13-year-old can walk into the parish hall and see a range of smiling faces who are pleased to see them! Dinner and Complines

#4

The monthly dinner and complines, organized by young adults for young adults, have proven to be a wonderful opportunity for Ascension's more established twenty-somethings to welcome the newer arrivals. From 'Burgers with the Bishop' to 'Samosas with Sima' it has been delightful to see Ascension's young professionals and grad students gather for dinner, welcome a guest speaker and engage them with questions, as well as introducing themselves to the new folks who are constantly arriving on a Sunday morning. I'm excited to see this monthly event open its doors to the new wave of college students arriving this fall, both graduate and undergraduate. Do get in touch with Leah and me if you'd like to join the leadership, catering or worship teams for these events. And remember; I am very thankful that this is NOT 'youth group for grown ups'!

Life Mentors

As someone who has lived in six different cities and three different countries since graduating from college, I know the ups and downs of being mobile and can sometimes feel slightly jealous of those who have extended family within reach. For the many young adults who have come to Pittsburgh for college or for work, and don't have parents or relatives nearby, I am glad that Ascension members have been hosting dinners and mentoring individuals. How do you prepare for your first Pittsburgh winter? How do you understand the different neighborhoods, Pittsburgh directions (turn left where the swimming pool used to be) and why are there fries on my salad? We are developing a network of life mentors who can regularly invest in those who appreciate guidance when facing this challenging season of life and would love to hear from you if you'd be interested in joining the team!

Just as these friends take kids under their wings for a season of life, investing and caring for them, before saying tearful goodbyes, I and the wonderful team of CAYG volunteers feel we are doing something similar—but with the particular focus of fostering their discipleship of the Lord Jesus Christ, that their relationship with Him and his people might be life-giving and life-long.

And all this is my long-winded way of saying that discipleship is really the point of all the varied events on the calendar opposite, and we would love you to pray that we, the leaders and your kids and your kids' friends, would truly grow as faithful disciples, now and into the future.

Youth Confirmation

Anglicanism requires a public and personal profession of the Faith from every adult believer in Jesus Christ. Confirmation by a bishop is its liturgical expression. In Confirmation, God, through the bishop's prayer for daily increase in the Holy Spirit and the laying on of hands, strengthens the believer for Christian life in the service of Christ and his kingdom. Grace is God's gift, and we pray that he will pour out his Holy Spirit on those who have already been made his children by adoption and grace in Baptism.

During the Confirmation service, the bishop will say: "Dearly beloved, it is essential that those who wish to be Confirmed in this Church must publicly confess Jesus Christ as their Lord and Savior; become his disciple; know and affirm the Nicene Creed, the Lord's Prayer, and the Ten Commandments; and have received instruction in the Holy Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments and the Catechism of the Church." But how do young confirmands learn the Nicene Creed? How can we at Ascension best help them understand the Old and New Testaments and the Catechism of the Church? How can we do this together?

The nine confirmands pictured here completed the first iteration of a two-year youth confirmation process. They met together for lunch on the first Sunday of each month, enjoyed the presentation of a guest speaker, discussed it together, and went home with an assignment to undertake with their confirmation mentor, the results of which they would present to the group the following month.

The 2018-2020 youth confirmation process follows a similar pattern of monthly lunches, mentors and homework assignments but has been streamlined from 16 to 12 main sessions, plus an introduction, end of course assessment and Confirmation Sunday itself. See opposite for an outline of the dates and the theme of each session. If you're interested in joining our team of confirmation mentors, or would like your child to be considered for the youth confirmation process, then please do contact me. I am very thankful that Tom Hillman and Zack Wilson have joined the team to run our monthly sessions, but am looking for a volunteer to coordinate the catering. I hope to hear from you!

Meeting new arrivals



With the beginning of the school year, we will go far, far back to beginnings as we turn towards digging into a deeper understanding of the Story of God's people throughout the Old Testament. We will walk through a narrative overview of the Hebrew Bible, from Genesis up through the Prophets. Our children will be invited into God's story as they learn about God's relationship with God's people and all His creation. With the history of God's people fresh in their minds, the children will be open to exploring the radical gift of the Incarnation as we begin again the church year with the Advent season. 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


