

Entering the Gate into a New Year

Jesus said: "I am the gate. Whoever enters by me will be saved..." (John 10:9, NRSV)

In her poem entitled *God Knows*, quoted by King George VI in his Christmas Day broadcast in 1939, English poet Minnie Haskins (1875-1957), wrote:

I said to the man who stood at the Gate of the Year,
"Give me a light that I may tread safely into the unknown."
And he replied, "Go out into the darkness and put your hand
into the hand of God. That shall be to you better than light,
and safer than a known way."

As we head into a new calendar year, we too need to put our hands into the hand of God to be prepared to face whatever may come in 2019. While we cannot know what joys or sorrows the coming year will bring, we do know two things. First, God is faithful and whatever may come he is our rock and our guide (Psalm 18:2). Second, we will face trials and temptations (James 1:2-4).

Given these two truths how might we prepare ourselves?
I want to suggest five practical ways:

1. Put on the armor of God


I encourage you to read Ephesians 6:10-17 where each piece of God's armor is described. As daily we put on the armor of God, we will be equipped to take our stand against the powers of this dark world and against the spiritual forces of evil (Eph. 6:12). And, by the way, these supernatural forces of evil get played out in very ordinary ways - in how we treat one another, in ethical and moral decisions, in the routines and habits of our daily lives.

2. Read your Bible

A new year gives us an opportunity to recommit ourselves to daily reading of God's word. There are many helpful guides and tools to assist us in this. Here are four that you might like to choose from:

- (i) The daily lectionary of the Anglican Church in North America. This lectionary is easy to use and clearly laid out with a daily reading plan to read the whole Bible in one year. Access the table of readings on line, www.anglicanchurch.net/media/Daily_Office_Lectionary.pdf
- (ii) The website www.legereme.com (Latin: *Legere* - to read) has the ACNA daily offices. Morning Prayer, Midday Prayer, Evening Prayer and Compline, the complete daily lectionary built in.
- (iii) "The Bible in one Year" (BIOY) is available as a free app for use on any smartphone. The app allows you to read and/or listen to portions of Scripture each day with a commentary from Nicky Gumbel (The rector of Holy Trinity Brompton, London) and a prayer each day.

(iv) Scripture Union provides daily devotional materials on line or in print for purchase. Visit www.scriptureunion.org.

3. Pray

At our parish retreat in the Fall of 2018 we explored rhythms and practices of prayer for everyday life. The importance of daily prayer cannot be over stated. Even if we take only a few minutes to be still before the Lord, pray The Lord's Prayer, listen, confess our sins, give thanks to God, present our requests to Him, and/or remember the needs of others, we will be more prepared to face whatever may come, than if we just charge into the day ahead.

I invite you to recommit yourself to daily prayer and see if there is another person with whom you could pray together at least once a week – a friend, your spouse or other family member.

4. Be in Community

In recent weeks we have regularly seen more than 500 people attending our Sunday services. This is great! But it's hard to know and be known among so many. That is why we have 25 community Groups meeting all over the city on any given day of the week. If you are presently in a Community group, I invite you to make your participation a priority this year. If you are *not* in a group, I invite you to try one out. (Details on p. 5)

5. Attend an Ascension class in 2019

- (i) The Drama of Scripture – one Saturday morning a month January through June (Details on p. 3)
- (ii) Parish Prayer Series focusing on healing and wholeness – one Sunday a month, after the 11am service, January through March (Details on p. 4).
- (iii) Lenten Workshops – four Fridays in Lent (March 22, 29 and April 5, 12). The Parish Retreat Prayer workshops will be repeated together with additional workshops on prayer.

May you put your hand into the hand of God in the year ahead.

An Invitation: The Drama of Scripture

One brief way of summarizing the vocation of the church of Jesus Christ is to say that it is the community that lives by the story of Jesus. We believe, teach, and confess that Jesus Christ is the ‘desire of every nation’ (Hag 2:7) and that his story is also the story of Israel. In Christ, the covenant that God made with Israel is opened to the nations. As Lauren Winner puts it, in the church the nations are given ‘intimacy with the God of Israel’.

To live by this story, we have to know this story, which means we must know how to read the Scriptures which tell this story. The Scriptures set out before us a grand drama of God’s rescue and restoration of his good creation, which begins with Abraham and Israel and culminates in Christ and the church which lives the story of Christ.

In the first half of 2019, we will be exploring our story by reading together **Craig Bartholomew and Michael Goheen’s *The Drama of Scripture***. Jonathan Warren, our Associate Rector, will teach six sessions on the narrative arc of Scripture, corresponding to the six ‘acts’ of the drama of redemption that Bartholomew and Goheen highlight.

This new year, make it a priority to immerse yourself in the Scriptures through the Daily Office or through the many Bible in One Year programs that are available online. Join us as well for this course as we explore how these texts fit together and how they proclaim the good news of the reconciliation of all things to God in Jesus Christ. 

An Invitation: Parish Prayer Series in Epiphany

The Gospel of Luke tells us, “Jesus sent his followers out to preach the Kingdom of God and to heal the sick.” (Luke 9:2) An impressive and possibly daunting mission!

Followers today too are sent out to preach the Gospel, yet often they do not feel equipped to respond to the second part of Jesus’ directive – “heal the sick.”

During Epiphanytide we will explore what it means to engage with our Lord in his mission of healing and wholeness. We will discover what it means to bring ourselves (and others) into the loving and compassionate presence of God for his care and healing.

The goal of this prayer series is to help us, as a community, live into one of our mission values, that of sharing Christ’s healing with a broken world. Whether or not this finds expression, for example, in official “prayer ministry,” in personal or corporate intercession, or simply in coming alongside another to pray and to care, these sessions aim to provide theological and practical foundations for the vital ministry of healing. Together we will focus on three different yet interwoven aspects of prayer: Emotional Healing, Physical Healing and Spiritual Healing.

This series will be team-taught by The Rev. Canons Jonathan & Andrea Millard and The Rt. Rev. Grant and Dr. Wendy LaMarquand. Each gathering will feature interactive talks, journal reflections, and large and small group discussions.

The gatherings are open to all, so come to one or come to all three. In keeping with the Epiphanytide ethos, come prepared to experience the ordinary side-by-side with the extraordinary, which are hallmarks of Jesus’ healing ministry.

Epiphanytide is the time between the end of the Twelve Days of Christmas and the beginning of Lent, on Ash Wednesday. Epiphany (January 6) is the day that commemorates the manifestation of Christ to the Magi, and the weeks that follow are marked by new and surprising beginnings.

Throughout Epiphanytide, the Gospel readings highlight episodes in Jesus’ ministry in seemingly “ordinary” circumstances (a baptism, a wedding, a sermon, etc.), however, these events contain an epiphany moment of sudden and striking realization that these are signs of the in-breaking Kingdom of God. Ordinary and extraordinary happen side-by-side.

God & New Year's Resolutions

It's a new year. 2019! Transform College Students, Transform Everything



Travel back with me to February 2014. The Winter Olympics in Sochi were well underway; The Lego Movie brought in the big bucks at the box office; Derek Jeter had just announced he will be retiring from the MLB; and a young, naïve freshman was about to have her world rocked at the Jubilee Conference.

**That freshman was me
and this is my Jubilee story.**

I wasn't exactly sure what to expect going to Jubilee for the first time. All I knew was that when they announced it at our campus ministry group people cheered, and that was a good enough reason for me to go. I wanted to be a part of whatever this excitement was. While Jubilee did turn out to be a ton of fun, filled with excitement and joy, it was also full of deep and challenging messages. One that deeply resonated with me was the talk about The Fall given by Dan Allender. Dan talked about shame and the way it affects our lives in ways that are even deeper than we often realize. However, as Christians our hope is in Christ, and He is our shame-bearer.

This talk changed my life. As Dan was speaking, I realized that I had A LOT of shame that I had never really dealt with. I remember feeling extremely overwhelmed and having no idea how to process this. Thankfully, I found that space to

process what I was thinking and feeling with others in our ministry. I began telling a couple people about these shameful experiences and allowed them to bear this burden with me. Maybe for you this is a customary practice, but for me, it went against every ounce of my being.

I felt completely exposed, and it was terrifying. These were some of my close friends, but I had only known them for a few months, and I didn't know how they would respond. I didn't know what they would think of me after this. But in God's grace and goodness, they responded with compassion and love, and I grew so much closer to them as a result. I learned that I wasn't alone, and I gained a sense of solidarity and mutuality with them. I had tasted community in the Kingdom of God, and I realized how much I had been starving myself.

From then I made many intentional efforts to break down my walls and let people in. I found that when you do this, people tend to let you into their lives as well. As we approach this season of giving and thanking God for all He has given us, I thought it would be appropriate to share our plans for mission and outreach as we return to Haiti in January 2019.

It is only through the caring heart and invitation of my daughter, Kaylynn, that I have been blessed with the opportunity to provide care for a very needy population in Thomassin, Haiti. After a fruitful six month stay aboard the Mercy Ship in Cameroon working as an RN, Kaylynn has returned to oncology nursing at the Hillman Center and again will be traveling with me to Haiti in January 2019 on a Medical/Dental mission trip along with many that have served to develop what has become an active clinic run by Haitians. It is hard to believe all that has been developed since our first trip out in 2012.

The mission statement of **Functional Literacy Ministry (FLM)** has been to help Haitians help themselves and this has truly been lived out as the clinic has been fully operational and care continues on a day to day basis after our mission team leaves. Haiti is the most impoverished third-world country in the western hemisphere. Nearly 80% of Haiti's eight million people live in absolute poverty. With the unemployment rate around 70%, a per capita income of \$350 a year, and an illiteracy rate of over 50%, the needs of Haitian people are both fundamental and great. Reflecting on a recent Sunday message on giving, I considered the why, the how, and the 'how much should we give' as we prepare and plan for this time away.

Why: God has blessed us with an ability to care for the medical and dental needs of others. Giving benefits others and "it is right so to do" – we have never given without being blessed tenfold!

How should we approach this: By giving our first fruits and not just what would be comfortable –Kaylynn has taught me much here, choosing to give first and to worry about her own needs later and, to no surprise, she has always been provided for. God has always made it possible to accomplish more than we could imagine.

How much: On this trip it has always been the best approach to give all you have. God has always carried us day to day and living amongst those who literally have nothing but their strong faith in God you can return only to be thankful for all we have as individuals and as a nation.

Please keep us in prayer as we begin gathering supplies for this medical mission. Pray for our safety, health and travel and our ability to reach out spiritually and medically to those so much in need. We thank you for your support in the past and welcome any support for the future.

Noticing What's Real

As we begin the new year and Epiphany, we combat distraction and abstraction through formation and incarnation

Technology is not a neutral tool. Our use of technology shapes us---one could even say it “disciples” us.

One way that new technology, particularly the internet, shapes us is to habituate us into dividing our attention. We are more capable of surface attention--consuming small, bite-size bits of information-- but less capable of depth attention. In his great book *The Shallows*, Nicholas Carr wrote, “Once I was a scuba diver in a sea of words, now I zip along the surface like a guy on a jet ski”. Carr makes the point that the way we now [almost constantly] consume small snatches of information actually rewires our brains so that we lose the capacity to follow long arguments and maintain attention. The implications of this shift for our theological debates can scarcely be overstated because, of course, sound theology requires us to sit with a complex argument over time. And we are actually losing the neurological capability to do so.

The implications of this shift on our spiritual formation can also scarcely be overstated--one simple definition of discipleship is learning to give attention to the right things.

Matthew Crawford, a philosopher, author, and motorcycle mechanic, has written about what he calls the ‘crisis of attention’ in our day. We live in a world of unprecedented distraction where whole industries exist to bait us with shiny objects that lure our attention away from the moment, the person, or the task in front of us.

How do we combat this? One way is to embrace practices of formation.

The Christian life, I’ve come to believe, is a craft as much as it is a set of beliefs. We have to take up habits and practices that shape our loves, our telos, and our attention.

We are not going to cultivate attention to the work and words of Jesus simply by trying to conjure up love for him in our hearts, greater and greater ardent emotion. After the fractious 2016 election, Andy Crouch said, “To be of any use to the world in these times, we have to practice the spiritual disciplines that make us different from the world.” And a chief place we do this is in our use of technology.

Apple-- more than the church--understands that what we live our lives for, our aim and our loves, are most often determined not simply by what we claim to believe but instead by the stuff we actually do...the way we spend our attention, our hours, our days. I never wake up in the morning and recite a creed: I believe in Steve Jobs, maker of heaven and earth. Yet, my use of my smart-phone trains me into a habit of resisting boredom at all costs, and shapes me into a person who cannot tolerate silence, who consumes more and more entertainment and information, and who skims the surface of relationships, arguments, even my own heart.

Taking up practices of fasting from technology, of rest, silence, embodied community, and prayer allows us to approach our ordinary days in a different light. Andy Crouch, says in his (highly recommended!) book *The Techwise Family* that, “The most powerful choices we will make in our lives are not about specific decisions but about patterns of life: the nudges and disciplines that will shape all our other choices.”

As we approach a new year, we can think intentionally about our habits of attention and the kind of nudges and disciplines we need to fix our attention on things that call us to abundance: practices that teach us to bask in God’s unrelenting love for us, to care for those flesh-and-blood people around us, and to notice God’s goodness and glory in our lives.

Our use of technology not only trains us toward distraction; it trains us toward abstraction. Social media in particular can encourage us to prioritize online relationships over face-to-face, embodied friendships.

The particular temptation in our moment of history is **abstraction**: to proclaim a love for the world, while hating actual people we know; to proclaim a love for God, but not know how to embody that in the small moments of our day.

We can have 2000 followers on twitter or instagram, but not have any close friends or not know the person who lives



across the street from us. I often quote an old Peanuts cartoon where Linus quips, “I love mankind! It’s people I can’t stand.”

In our moment of history, people—perhaps especially younger people-- can come to see justice seeking as using the right hashtag but not as loving and serving the actual people on our block, in our dorm, in our families, even especially those people who we think are wrong.

How do we combat the temptation of abstraction?

I’d like to submit that the incarnation of Jesus dealt a death blow to any spirituality that is abstracted. We do not serve a far off God, but one who came into the concrete, who took on skin, and lived most of his life as an average guy. Jesus had bad breath and aching feet; he worked and loved his neighbor, his actual neighbor, who didn’t think he was anyone all that special. He loved actual people with proper names.

Former archbishop Michael Ramsey wrote that:

*The glory of Christianity is its claim that small things really matter and that the small company, the very few, the one man, the one woman, the one child are of infinite worth to God. Let that be your inspiration. Consider our Lord himself. Amidst a vast world with its vast empires and vast events and tragedies our Lord devoted himself to a small country, to small things, and to individual men and women, often giving hours of time to the very few or to the one man or woman. In a country where there were movements and causes which excited the allegiance of many – the Pharisees, the Zealots, the Essenes, and others – our Lord gives many hours to one woman of Samaria, one Nicodemus, one Martha, one Mary, one Lazarus, one Simon Peter, **for the infinite worth of the one is the key to the Christian understanding of the many.** (emphasis mine)*

To approach life as if attention to concrete people and places around us matter, as if the most important person to us is the one in front of us, is indeed a radical way to live.

The only place that we can love God and serve others in the real, limited circumstances that we find ourselves in today.

The hope we celebrate each Christmas, and indeed each Sunday, reminds us that it is the concrete, not the abstract, that saves the world. Specifically our concrete and real God, in his concrete and real incarnation, made a people, his church, who live our concrete and real lives in ways that He uses to make all things new.

God is working, and wonderfully so, in the very real, messy, ordinary, and palpable reality of our lives. Our small, daily acts of prayer and loving our neighbors are what God uses to change the world.

And, astonishingly, you (and I) are loved by God—not as an abstraction, not as merely a particle in the vast sea of humanity, not as your (or my) ideal self, not as you (or I) imagine we should be—but as who you (and I) actually are, with all our complexity, and failure and beauty, with a proper name.

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Team Thailand

- Pray about the biggest question of all - What might God want to do??




Saturday, February 23 9am – lunch Ascension Hunt Rooms
