

A Letter from Bishop Grant

May 2018: From Easter to Trinity Sunday

May is an important month! Every Sunday we learn something more of who God is.

Of course, it all starts with the rather strange liturgical event that seems to be called "Marathon Weekend". By the time you read this you will know that Sunday is on Saturday that week because getting to church on the Sunday of the Pittsburgh Marathon just doesn't seem to work.


Then we have three weeks in a row of special services:

May 13 is Ascension Sunday, the event after which our church is named, and at which we look at the ascension and honor the ascended Christ. As is our usual practice our diocesan bishop, Jim Hobby, will be here to celebrate with us and to confirm those who will be asking for a special in-filling of the Spirit on that day. Some, especially some of our young people, have been preparing for this confirmation service for two years! Please keep these confirmands in your prayers as this day approaches.

May 20 is the Feast of Pentecost, when we remember the birthday of the church. Pentecost is not just the church's birthday - it is an important mission day. On Pentecost we remember that the mission of the church could only begin after the first believers were filled with the Holy Spirit - the immediate results being a multi-lingual proclamation of the mighty

acts of God (Acts 2:4-11) and the conversion and baptism of 3,000 new believers on that first day of the church's existence. Since Pentecost is the beginning of the church's world-wide mission, it is appropriate that **on May 20 the whole congregation is invited to a lunch after the 11am service** so that Wendy and I can share a bit more about the work of the church in the Horn of Africa. More about that in a moment.

Trinity Sunday on May 27 concludes our month of special services. Who is this God who loves us - Father, Son and Holy Spirit? Trinity Sunday sometimes gets short shrift. After the excitement of Holy Week and Easter, Ascension Sunday and Pentecost, perhaps we just get a bit tired. In most churches in the Western world, Christmas and Easter are the big feast days. The Ethiopian Orthodox Church has a different perspective. Their big day is "Timkat" - the feast of the baptism of Jesus by John the Baptist. This confused me at first. "How could such an event outrank Christmas and Easter?" until it was pointed out to me that Jesus' baptism was the first public appearance of the Trinity! As the Son is baptized, we see the Spirit descend and hear the voice of the Father. The self-giving love of God we celebrate at Christmas and Easter is the love of the Trinity: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.


A few more words about May 20:

As most of you know, my wife Wendy and I have recently returned from Ethiopia where we served as missionaries of SAMS (the Society of Anglican Missionaries and Senders). Amidst the hardship and the joy, the love of God was evident.

Gambella, where most of the Anglican churches are, is poor, neglected, hot, and politically unstable. Crises are the norm. In rainy season floods destroy homes and crops. In dry season fires do the same. Food insecurity, lack of employment, shortages of water, electricity and internet access, thousands of new refugees from the war next door in South Sudan, and frequent ethnic tensions - to say nothing of the snakes, scorpions, hyenas and crocodiles - make life vulnerable. On the worst days Wendy and I would sometimes look at each other and say, "Wouldn't it be nice to worship at Ascension this Sunday?" Now that we are back in North America, I am sure that there will soon be days when we will look at each other and say, "Wouldn't it be wonderful to worship in Gambella this week?"

During our years in Ethiopia, Ascension (both the church and individuals from this congregation) has partnered with us in prayer and in financial support. Some of you even came and worked with us for a while in Gambella. Thank you so much.

Please join us for "11 and Lunch" on May 20 and learn a bit more about what God has - and is - doing in a special part of the world. Lunch is by donation. Childcare will be provided for ages K and younger.



2 Opportunities For Special Prayer in May

As we have been reading and preaching in the Book of Acts since Easter we have been reminded that the church (and individual believers!) can only do God's work in the world in and through the power of the Holy Spirit. Ascension Sunday

On Sunday, May 13 we will welcome our Bishop, Jim Hobby, to our services. He will preach and preside at the Eucharist at both the 9am and the 11am service. At the 11am service several members of the congregation will receive the rite of Confirmation. Confirmation is a service in which those previously baptized have the opportunity publicly to affirm their faith in Jesus Christ and receive prayer and the laying on of hands by the Bishop that the Holy Spirit will strengthen them for ongoing ministry.



Feast of Pentecost

On the next Sunday, May 20, we remember the coming of the Holy Spirit on the church 2,000 years ago. This seems a wonderful opportunity for anyone who desires a fresh filling of the Spirit. On that day, during the time in which the congregation receives Communion, Bishop Grant will be available to pray for anyone who feels led to come forward to receive prayer for an infilling of the Spirit. There is no need to sign up for this. More details will be announced as we come closer to the day.

The key thing here is to remember that all those who believe in Jesus are *indwelt* with the Spirit - that doesn't change - God's Spirit will never leave us. On the other hand, being *filled* with the the Spirit for ministry is an ongoing need. Ephesians 5:18 instructs us to "be filled with the Spirit" - and the sense of the Greek tense there is continuous: "continue to be filled with the Spirit", or "be filled with the Spirit over and over."

Adult Education

The Corinthian correspondence was written to a people in crisis. Paul had originally preached the gospel to the Corinthians, but they had succumbed to factionalism, with 'heart divisions' (one very appropriate way to translate the Greek word that has historically been translated 'schism') ripping apart the body of Christ. These heart divisions tore the body itself apart and led them to doubt Paul's efficacy as an apostle. 2 Corinthians is Paul's spirited defense of his ministry to the Corinthians, which he strikingly casts as an illustration of the 'power of the cross', which he had already proclaimed to them 'as of first importance' (1 Cor. 15:3).

Anyone concerned about our present 'heart divisions' in the church should want to hear about the apostle Paul's ministry of reconciliation (2 Cor. 5:11-21) and how it formed hearts and minds in ancient Corinth and can do so again in our midst. Join us on Saturday May 12 from 10:30am to 12pm for an introduction to this important Pauline letter. Light snacks and childcare provided.

MISSIONS Teams up with Children's Ministry

Each year Ascension's Children's Ministry encourages the support of our local pregnancy center at Women's Choice Network (WCN). The Baby Bottle Campaign is a simple and creative way for us to partner in mission with this organization.

Typically, we have run the campaign from Mother's Day to Father's Day. However, there are logistical challenges with those dates this year. So... in honor of Mothers,

whose day we celebrate in May, and Fathers, whose day we celebrate in June, and the Holy Spirit, who works in the hearts and lives of families, this year's Baby Bottle Campaign will run from Pentecost through the end of June. Look for the table and display in the Parish Hall on May 20 and pick up your baby bottles!

WCN's medical clinics offer free pregnancy tests, STD testing and treatment, sonograms, medical consultations, and caring, confidential, and non-judgmental options counseling. When abortion vulnerable women come to one of the four centers in the Pittsburgh area and see their sonogram, 85% will choose life! Clients are encouraged to enroll in "Life Support," an ongoing accountability program that enables families to earn while they learn. Childbirth, parenting classes, and life skill programs allow clients to earn clothing, furnishings, formula, and other items.

Services also include post-abortion care and education on abstinence and healthy relationships. WCN works with schools, churches, and community groups to share the benefits of sexual abstinence and the message of the sanctity of human life.

All of these services are offered under the direction of a professional medical staff and are provided at no charge to clients because of generous gifts from individuals and churches. WCN is not funded by any state or federal dollars. They rely on local partners to help give hope to a new generation.

Meg Sateia is a member at Ascension who volunteers at the Northside center as a Client Advocate doing options counseling and facilitating Life Support classes. She says, "I love that my title includes the word 'advocate' because it makes me think of how Jesus was an advocate to people in vulnerable positions. That is what I get to do through this ministry. I am in a unique position to meet with people who are in the midst of a crisis, provide them with a listening ear, and offer them both the tangible support they need and the hope of the Gospel." This is my 15th year as Rector of Ascension and 26th year as a priest; (and Andrea's 7 years as a priest and 15th in ministry.) I am extremely grateful for the Sabbatical Ascension is giving me and pray that it will be beneficial for us all. Please pray that we will be able to enter in to the four areas I have outlined for this Sabbatical time: Rest, Reading, Recreation and Research.

As I wrote in the January Ascent, I will be reflecting on how I am being called to serve God and Ascension in the final quarter of my full-time ministry as a priest in Christ's church. I will be spending some time with other long-tenured rectors of large churches learning how they have maintained faithful and fruitful ministries. I am also going to be exploring if/how they have managed to transition from being rector as a "CEO" to being rector as "Father-in-God."

There will be time for slowing down, for rest, and renewal - including much longed-for time to read. We will be spending time at home and away together and with our families in the UK and in New England.

In April's Ascent, I shared my longing for our church family that we might increasingly be a community of Christians that is marked by: Deep Love, Deep Care, Deep Belonging, Deep Prayer, and Deep Dependency on the Holy Spirit. We will be praying for these things for ourselves and for you, our brothers and sisters in Christ.

Finally, until we see you again, after August 18th, "Be strong in the Lord and in the strength of his power." (Ephesians 6:10).

Week 4 (April 30 to May 6)

Monday through Friday: Jonathan and Andrea will be on retreat at Lee Abbey, in Devon. This will be a time for prayer, spiritual direction, and hiking.
