ASH WEDNESDAY SERVICES March 6 Noon and 7pm

Please consider keeping 'a holy Lent' and join us on Ash Wednesday. We will have services at Noon and 7pm. Childcare will be provided at both services.

Ash Wednesday derives its name from the practice of blessing ashes made from palm branches and placing them on the heads of participants with the words "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return."

According to the gospels of Matthew, Mark and Luke, Jesus spent 40 days fasting in the desert, where he endured temptation by Satan. Lent originated as a mirroring of this, fasting 40 days as preparation for Easter. Ash Wednesday, a day of fasting, is the first day of Lent. It occurs 46 days before Easter (40 fasting days and 6 Sundays which are non-fasting days).

A Marriage Enrichment Class

The insight we offer comes from making many mistakes, and years of praying for wisdom. Our prayer is that soon you will discover what we havethe relief that comes from resolution, deep understanding and comfort "

Thailand Partnership: SHALEM HOUSE

Ascension hopes to grow a deep partnership with our brothers and sisters from the Anglican Church in Thailand, and with that in mind, over the course of the next few months introductions will be made to many of the people and ministries that our team had the opportunity to visit this past January. Members of Ascension's team that visited Thailand in January include Marilyn Chislaghi, Denise Cox, Andrea and Jonathan Millard, and Joel Scandrett.

Shalem House, a narrow 4-story cement building situated in the heart of Bangkok, began in 1998 as a shelter for mothers of children with illnesses. Here's just one story of thousands...

On a rainy night, a woman slowly dragged her weary legs into a convenience store with a little toddler trailing behind her. The woman pleaded for hot water to prepare milk for her daughter but was chased out of the store. This episode did not escape the notice of Miss Jarin, a social worker from Shalem House who was providentially present in the store at the same time. She spoke to the woman and found out that her elder daughter was admitted into Bangkok Hospital with heart problems. The woman and her younger daughter were staying overnight in a public park as she could not afford the cost of accommodation in Bangkok city. Jarin took the mother and daughter to Shalem House.

Twenty years after its founding, and after expansion to an identical building next door, Shalem House can accommodate up to 60 people at one time. Those who stay as guests are now male and female, young and old, patients, family of patients. The accommodations are modest, but all those who stay are offered a simple roll out mattress and sheet, a safe environment, a shared kitchen, and most importantly, a second home when weeks turn into months of hospital treatment. The guiding concept of Shalem House is 'family'.

Ascension's team was privileged to meet Miss Jarin, who remains the sole caretaker and manager of Shalem House. She advises all who stay of house routines and responsibilities, makes sure the facility has basic upkeep, and manages conflicts and relational problems that arise when people from various backgrounds live in close quarters together.

Shalem House is a ministry of Christ Church Bangkok (which hosts both English and Thai congregations) and also receives funding from Church of Our Saviour in Singapore. Church members regularly provide dinners, organize group games or activities for occupants, and

offer prayer ministry which is widely received by lodgers, most of whom come from Buddhist backgrounds. The purpose of Shalem House is to hold out hope in God for people whose lives have been full of hardship. As a result, all have experienced deep love and compassion and over the years many have also come to faith in Jesus Christ.

Ascension's team visited Shalem House on a late afternoon in January. We prayed for all patients and their families, several of whom suffered from brain tumors and other forms of cancer, and even offered prayer for a young man who was recovering from a heart transplant.

Please mark your calendars for **Sunday, May 19th.** The Ascension Thailand team will bring a full report back to the congregation at an **11 & Lunch** gathering and will lay out ways forward for our partnership with the good work of the

Occasional Prayers: Praying with the Church

"When I am praying Prayer Book prayers I am not alone; I am joining my voice with the voice of Christians – past, present and future – who also pray these prayers for the church, for society, for families, for personal lives and more."

Have you ever wanted to pray for someone, but just didn't have words to express your heart's desires? I know I have.

One of the things that I value about being a Christian in the Anglican tradition is that we have a Book of Common Prayer that provides well crafted, theologically sound, and historically patterned prayers that address a wide range of life situations. When I am praying Prayer Book prayers I am not alone; I am joining my voice with the voice of Christians – past, present and future – who also pray these prayers for the church, for society, for families, for personal lives and more.

This June the Anglican Church in North America (ACNA) will release a hard copy of the 2019 ACNA Book of Common Prayer – something that's been in process since the founding of the Province in 2009. This is an exciting development in the history of our church! But we don't have to wait until June to begin praying "Occasional Prayers" since they are available online now. You can check them out by going to the ACNA's website, and searching under the "Text for Common Prayer" tab (http:// anglicanchurch.net/?/main/ texts for common prayer). Once there, look for the section titled "Occasional Prayers."

Here are a few ways I have prayed using Occasional Prayers taken from the Prayer Book:

When I am writing a birthday card to a friend or family member, I often handwrite on the inside of the card a prayer "For a Birthday" (prayer number 66 under the *Family and Personal Life* section). I write the person's name where indicated by the "*N*." and change the pronoun to fit the person.

66. For a Birthday

O God, our times are in your hand: Look with favor, we pray, on your servant N. as he begins another year. Grant that he may grow in wisdom and grace, and strengthen his trust in your goodness all the days of his life; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Or if I am praying for someone who has lost a job I turn to pray prayer number 46 in the *Society* section and say the prayer "For the Unemployed":

46. For the Unemployed

Heavenly Father, we remember before you those who suffer want and anxiety from lack of work. Guide the people of this land so to use our public and private wealth that all may find suitable and fulfilling employment, and receive a just reward for their labor; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

I often pray for those in our communities, workplaces, schools and families who are caught in the fierce grip of addiction. Prayer 62, "For Those in Bondage to Addiction," found under the *Intercessions for Those in Need* section is particularly compassionate, supportive and hopeful:

62. For Those in Bondage to Addiction

O blessed Lord, you ministered to all who came to you: Look with compassion upon those who through addiction have lost their health and freedom. Restore to them the assurance of your unfailing mercy; remove from them the fears that beset them; strengthen them in the work of their recovery; and to those who minister to them, give patient understanding and persevering love; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Beginning in Lent we will be introducing Occasional Prayers each week by inserting one of them into Sunday's bulletin (near the back on the same page as the information about the Altar Flowers). My hope is that together we will find these to be a rich source of encouragement. Perhaps your family or community group will find ways to incorporate them into your times of prayer together.

May the Lord accept our prayers as we join our voices, saying:

97. For the Acceptance of Prayer

O Lord our God, accept the fervent prayers of your people; in the multitude of your mercies, look with compassion upon us and all who turn to you for help; for you are gracious, O lover of souls, and to you we give glory, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, now and for ever. Amen.

Page 8 Missions Focus

Jewel Anita Hendrix is a long-time missionary of Ascension, who started in Central America where she worked with an orphanage and then with *Food for the Hungry* for 18 years. Her ministry now is out of Tauranga, NZ, and aimed at the restoration of ALL to God's original intentions for the world. She works with two partners: *Reconciled World* and *Youth With a Mission (YWAM)*.

For *Reconciled World*, Jewel Anita's role is to pray, create tools for others to pray more effectively, and to raise up others to pray. She is part of several intercessory groups in Tauranga, and runs prayer times called "Justice Prayer," where people take time to talk about justice issues in depth (trafficking, refugees, abortion, genocide, etc.), and then pray for those issues, as well as doing prayer walks. Her *Reconciled World* work fits nicely with her role with a program called *YWAM Furnace*, in which Jewel Anita works to raise up students and staff in prayer and teaching. She teaches courses in Tauranga and internationally (last year, in Fiji, Cambodia, Uganda, Solomon Islands, and Tonga).

In July, Jewel Anita took up leadership of *Justice Reach*, another YWAM ministry, and has been integrating her work *YWAM Furnace* work with the work of *YWAM Justice Reach* to create partnerships with local ministries such as the following:

Ahi Toi Toi Manawa (a support network for kids in foster care, camps, activities, etc.),

Street Help (a ministry to those in the bar/brothel scene)

Koha Shop (like a clothing closet for the needy)

Good Neighbor (practical help for random needs)

Pregnancy Choice (crisis pregnancy center)

Jewel Anita works with these partners building relationships and encouraging the Church to become more kingdom minded, creating spaces for YWAM staff and students to serve and support those they are working with, and encouraging people in the local churches to become involved with each of these ministries. Justice Reach also offers courses (3-6 month) for young adults (18-25yrs.) and trainings for churches. Jewel Anita oversees a full staff team in order to accomplish all this.

Jewel Anita asks for prayer for:

- 1. For wisdom and boldness from God to do or say the right thing in the situations she is faced with.
- 2. For long term staff for Justice Reach
- 3. For her prayer time before leading Justice Reach, Jewel Anita took 4 hours a day for prayer, what she felt God had told her to do. She's finding it hard to do that in her new role with Justice Reach. Pray that she could find and protect this sacred time with God.
- 4. For health, sleep, refreshment, logistics of travel.
- 5. For full fruit to come from Jewel Anita's ministry.
- 6. For perseverance especially in prayer. Often as an intercessor, you don't see the direct impact of your work.





A missional community in New Zealand, centered around prayer, worship, and love for God's presence. We train and equip disciples to be sent into the nations. We offer several Discipleship Training Schools (DTS) as well as several different secondary YWAM schools for further training. The Furnace Prayer Room offers a place where individuals can unite through music-led prayer meetings.



Our focus as a ministry is the vulnerable in our neighborhoods: The poor, the neglected, the persecuted, the exploited and the abused. We agree with Edmund Burke that "All that is required for evil to triumph is for good men to do nothing." We are called to do our bit, however small. We can't stay silent, we must add our voice to the many others around the world speaking into situations of injustice, saying "we will not let evil triumph but will fight and speak up for good to triumph."

We believe we all can make a difference whoever we are with and

wherever we are.




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Young Adult Ministry

College Ministry:



What Happens at Jubilee.

This past month Ascension's college ministry, *Venite*, had 11 students attend the CCO's Jubilee conference. The weekend consisted of superb speakers (featuring our very own Tish Warren), invigorating worship, thoughtprovoking workshops, and profound community building. However, all weekend we kept hearing the **phrase "What happens at Jubilee** <u>doesn't stay</u> at Jubilee" reminding us that our lives are not meant for the mountain tops—though those experiences play an important role in our growth and motivation—but that we were meant for the valleys.

As we were driving back to campus—back to the valley—on Sunday afternoon, the tone of enthusiasm and eagerness in the conversations being had assured me that the students were taking Jubilee with them for the long haul. Joshua, a CMU student, was saying, "I learned about how the restoration of all things isn't just something to look forward to in the future, but it's happening in the here and now, and we are called to play a role in it." Emily went on to share about specific ways we can do this and talked about what she had learned in workshops on honoring God and loving our neighbors through government and politics. She said, "Christians are called and have a moral duty to bridge the divide in these areas," and this is something she wants to pursue back on campus.

I continued to be encouraged on Sunday evening when I walked into the Old Catacombs for Youth Group and heard Gabbie, one of our Pitt students who attended Jubilee, sharing what she had learned over the weekend with several of our high schoolers. She was talking about a workshop she had attended where she learned about the role hospitality has to play in undoing the effects of colonialism. Another workshop speaker challenged her by saying that if we aren't practicing hospitality, we aren't truly practicing Christianity. And here Gabbie was sharing, equipping, and calling these high schoolers to the same standard of living that she was called to at Jubilee. Later in the evening, Austin shared about how a speaker convicted him by reminding him that because of sin he is also a victimizer, not just a victim. He then challenged the high schoolers to reflect on this truth in their lives.

These students give me so much joy and hope. They are already bringing back the Jubilee vision to their campuses and to their churches. I ask that you would pray with me for them, that the ripple effect from this conference would continue to broaden into every one of their spheres of influence and into every square inch of their lives.

As a newly-converted teenager, he met a couple of seminary students who had been fasting and praying, once a week, for months, for a young man to disciple who showed great leadership potential. Gimme 5

Three years ago, we would have expected around 30 involved in a normal weekend of youth group activity. Last weekend we had 87 and have been averaging about 80 since last summer. However, a fair few of these will be moving on this summer as they graduate from college or are moving to take up new positions elsewhere. So, I am praying for 5 more volunteers to be regularly involved by May. Maybe 5 by 5.5! In particular I am praying for a RANGE of ages, ideally one new person from five different decades (in their 20s, 30s, 40s, 50s and 60s).

And I am looking for more prayerful, kind and courageous Christians! The two evenings to be involved are Friday nights (with Middle Schoolers) and Sunday nights (with High Schoolers). The Friday night experience begins with a cooked dinner for volunteers at 5.30pm, after which we set up and welcome middle schoolers at 6.30pm. Following songs and prayers and a short talk, we transition into small groups for a Bible study and 'share and prayer.' Leading these small groups is often the most demanding and rewarding of the various parts of the evening. Small group time is followed by a big game or other fun options, before we conclude all together for news, interviews, and a final prayer and song. Sunday night is similar, with the exception that we eat with the high schoolers who arrive at 6pm, and the dinner is usually pizza! To find out more, please contact Alex (email above).
