Welcome to our new Children's Ministry Director, Catherine Slocum

As announced in June, Catherine Slocum accepted the call to be our next Director of Children's Ministry. Rector's Summer Reading



One of the things I am so looking forward to doing over our upcoming vacation is reading! On my personal list is the latest historical novel in the Shardlake series by C.J. Sansom. I also plan to finish reading the biography of Steve Jobs. Two other books I'm eager to pick up are: "The Good and Beautiful God: Falling in Love with the God Jesus Knows," and "The Magnificent Story: Uncovering a Gospel of Beauty, Goodness and Truth," both by James B. Smith, whom I heard speak at the recent ACNA Assembly in Texas last month. These books look like great resources for our Community Groups or for anyone who wants to grow in their Christian life.

My one big recommendation to *everyone*, however, is "Surprise the World" by Michael Frost. Chris Massa has written a helpful review of this book (page 5). This is a short, reasonably priced (\$8.00), easy to read book. I confess it's not a great literary work, and you might not find anything particularly new in its pages, but I believe if you and I were to take up the habits outlined in this book it could transform the way we live and our church family. If you read nothing else this summer, read this book!

More Than Stones: Welcoming our Neighbors, Reaching the Nations

It gives me great joy to write about our *More Than Stones* capital stewardship campaign. As recently as 18 months ago, I'm not sure I could have imagined writing the words *great joy* and *capital campaign* in the same sentence! But last year something profound changed in me. During my time away on Sabbatical three things became crystal clear:

First, the time to address the major maintenance issues that have beset our buildings, but which until last year we were unable comprehensively to address, is **Now**.

Second, the lens through which I believe God would have us approach this endeavor is: Mission.

Third, I have increasingly come to realize that this effort will take **Sacrificial Giving**.

How do these three things come together? The theme of the Global Anglican Future Conference, which I attended in Jerusalem last year was: "Proclaiming Christ Faithfully to the Nations." The reality for us at Ascension is that: **The nations have come to Pittsburgh, and the nations are our neighbors.**

We are uniquely situated here in Oakland. We are surrounded by 50,000 college students and thousands of young professionals who work in the areas of law, finance, robotics, computer science, medicine and education. Our neighbors come from all over the world and many will go out to the ends of the earth after their time in Pittsburgh.

Our Mission

Over the past few years we have seen remarkable growth in our midst. This year alone Sunday attendance has increased by 10%. We have never seen so many children, youth, young adults and families. We are starting new Community Groups as fast as we can train leaders, and every Sunday we are privileged to have visitors among us.

Given this season of life and health and growth coupled with the mandate to proclaim Christ faithfully to the nations, how might Ascension through our physical stones <u>and</u> through we who are the *living* stones, radiate the *light*, the *love* and the *life* of Christ? Surely this is our mission!

Ministry Opportunities

What if, over the next few years:

- Sunday Morning attendance increases to over 700?
- Youth Group doubles from 80 to 160?
- Children's Ministry doubles from 100 to 200?
- Community Groups explode from 28 to 58?
- We add a new Sunday Morning service within 3 years?
- International Ministry triples from 100 to 300 students?
- 10 new families join our Special Needs Ministry?
- We welcome 50 new people into our Seniors Ministry?
- We bring on staff several CCO Fellows?
- We bring on staff an Asian missionary?
- We send teams to Southeast Asia each year?
- We plant a church off-site within 5 to 7 years?









The many ministry opportunities are clearly about something *more* than stones. At the same time, this campaign is not about something *less* than stones. I believe we are now being called to repair and improve our facilities to maximize the opportunities for ministry and mission on our doorstep. I am excited to see what the Holy Spirit will do in and through us as we proclaim Christ faithfully in Pittsburgh, through our vocations, to our neighbors, and to the ends of the earth.

Process Update

May was quite a month with 12 listening sessions that generated 1,430 responses! Thank you to the more than 320 people who attended one of those sessions and to the 200 people who attended one of the two Town Hall Meetings in June.

In response to the congregational feedback the vestry agreed, at its meeting on June 25, to adjust the statement of our needs in our Capital Stewardship Campaign to include a specific component directed to funding Ministry and Mission.

There are now three clear goals before us:

- 1. Ministry and Mission
- 2. Refurbishment and Renewal
- 3. Essential Repairs

The current estimated costs of doing all this work is as follows.

Ministry & Mission:

\$650,000

Provide a reserve fund to meet necessary staffing levels to facilitate current and projected growth (transitional arrangement until operating income grows to meet these needs)

Refurbishment & Renewal:

\$3,750,000

Improvements to existing facilities to maximize ministry and mission opportunities including expansion of the Parish Hall

Essential Repairs:

\$3,600,000

Stonework, windows, roofs, internal work in the nave

Other Project Costs & Expenses:

\$200,000

Total: \$8,200,000

Home Visitations

The goal of our Financial Stewardship Campaign is to visit every home and invite people to participate. Some will be able to give much, others a little. But all can give something. In Luke 2 we read: "[Jesus] looked up and saw rich people putting their gifts into the treasury; he also saw a poor widow put in two small copper coins. He said, "Truly I tell you, this poor widow has put in more than all of them; for all of them have contributed out of their abundance, but she out of her poverty has put in all she had to live on."

Equal Sacrifice

Our *More Than Stones* initiative calls for equal sacrifice not equal gifts, with *everyone* doing their part. Our giving needs to be over and above regular annual giving and can be made over three years. As I have begun to visit people I have been very moved to hear the stories of those who are truly giving sacrificially. Some are postponing retirement, others are accessing savings and IRA accounts, bonuses and pay raises. One couple decided to put off changing their cars. There are many ways that people are rising to the invitation to give sacrificially.


More Than Stones Prayer

Surprise The World

Book Review

The theme of our fall Parish Retreat at Laurelville (Oct 4 – 6) is "Surprise the World". We will have a great variety of speakers including Jonathan & Andrea Millard, Tish & Jonathan Warren, Mark Stevenson, the Dean of Thailand (Ching Wah Ye) as well the head of the school located in Chiang Mai (Jeanne Yee-Gan). The core of the retreat will be based on the principles expressed in this small book. It is easy summer reading if you want to order a copy (they sell for around \$8.00).

First, a confession: I don't know how to do evangelism. Yes, of course, I know how I'm *supposed* to do evangelism — at least, how I've been *told* I'm supposed to do evangelism — but I've never been able to internalize and translate it into something that I actually *do*. I've learned countless gimmicks and acronyms, each one supposed to make sharing my faith easier and more successful, and I've read a handful of books on the subject as well. But the more I do, and the more I read, the more I end up feeling guilty rather than motivated, and the more I recognize that evangelism is something that I simply don't know how to do. I'm ashamed to admit that, more often than not, evangelism is something that I've left up to other people. To borrow from the late Dallas Willard, the Great Commission has been my great omission.

Which brings me to Michael Frost's *Surprise the World*. Of all the books I've read on evangelism, *Surprise the World* is unique. I'm not saying it's a great book — more on that in a moment — but it does something so rare that it feels kind of revolutionary: It demystifies the Great Commission. Rather than teaching a technique for evangelism, it reframes mission as something virtually anyone can do, and that all followers of Christ should do. It even goes so far as to draw a distinction between evangelism — something that some are uniquely called, equipped, and gifted to do — and living missionally —something that we are all called to do, whether we're gifted evangelists or not. In this way, it feels like a helpful tonic to all of the books, acronyms, and flannelgraph presentations. It feels like a game-changer, and maybe it is.

Yes, Frost introduces an acronym in *Surprise the World*, but rather than being a tool for evangelism —that is, something for us to "use" on nonbelievers — this acronym functions as more of a mnemonic device, a memory aid for the reader. Frost's model for mission is deceptively simple: If we cultivate a habit of *blessing* others, *eating* with others, *listening* to the Holy Spirit, *learning* Christ, and seeing ourselves as being *sent*, we are mirroring the

actions of Christ, and we are laying the groundwork for the kingdom of God. That's it, although I would draw your attention to the word *habit*. This is not a program or a campaign, but a way of life. It is a biblical, practical way of living missionally.

I will happily admit that, from a literary standpoint, *Surprise the World* has very little to distinguish it, and I suspect that the author would agree with me. I've read enough of his work to know that Michael Frost is capable of writing something that makes for intellectually stimulating reading, but this isn't that kind of book. The modesty of *Surprise the World* goes back to its roots: It started out as a slender e-book entitled *The Five Habits of Highly Missional People*, and while *Surprise the World* represents a fleshing-out of the original material, it still reads like a slightly expanded pamphlet. I would argue that *Surprise the World* is hardly a book at all, but a tool. A pair of pliers doesn't need to be particularly elegant to get the job done, but they do have to work. Simply stated, I think the lack of flourishes is an asset in the case of *Surprise the World*. You will not be dazzled by Frost's witty writing and clever turns-of-phrase, and you're not supposed to be. His goal is to point the way to a missional lifestyle, and do so clearly, in a way that can't be easily ignored or forgotten. As such, he succeeds brilliantly.

There's another way that *Surprise the World* is not like most books. It is not a book that should be read and pondered, or that is designed to give you interesting ideas and a fresh perspective. Rather, it is a manual for action. If we are willing to read *Surprise the World* as the writer intended, it will result in change, both in the way we live and the world around us. It may even result in us living out our calling: that we would be sent out to do the work the Lord has given us to do, to love and serve him as faithful witnesses of Christ our Lord. Thanks be to God.



The vision for Community Groups at Ascension comes from the description of the early church's practice in Acts 2:42-7.

The church devoted itself to four core practices: devotion to the apostle's teaching, fellowship, sharing meals, and prayer.

As we know from the rest of Acts, these core practices formed the community for the sake of bearing witness to Christ in word and deed to Jerusalem, Judea, Samaria, and 'the ends of the earth'.

The New Testament is clear that this commission is not issued to solitary disciples, but to the body of Christ, the people that God is forming for himself. The Bible affirms the dignity, the worth, and the freedom of the individual, but it repudiates individualism. Individualism, which can be summarized as a belief in personal autonomy and self-creation, is at odds with the biblical conviction that "we are individually members of one another" (Rom. 12:5). As the biblical scholar Craig Bartholomew argues, "we need a spirituality that will undermine western individualism." In addition to corporate worship every Sunday, our Community Groups are the chief way that we express our conviction that we are a body and not isolated individuals with private relationships to Christ.

Our Community Groups bear these commitments and practices out in different ways. Some groups meet every week, others meet every other week. Some share a meal at every meeting, others elect to do so on special occasions. All of our groups are open to participation by anyone, but they differ in the degree of commitment that they require. Some groups are open and flexible in terms of participation. Some groups, which we call Rule of Life Community Groups, require a greater degree of commitment. At the heart of all of our groups, however, is the commitment to form disciples into the body of Christ through the core practices of the faith for the sake of the mission of the gospel.

A Preference for Geographical Proximity

The long history of the church demonstrates that the practices of the church are most formative when the members of the church live close to one another and can DO life together. Another way to say this is that the more disparate and diffuse we become geographically, the less we resemble a body and the more we resemble a group of isolated individuals who happen to show up at the same place once a week.

Among secular intellectuals, there is a vast literature documenting and lamenting the 'crisis of place' that has been introduced as a result of car culture. This literature highlights the lack of flourishing that results from being constantly on the go in our cars and not deeply rooted in particular places, but also the way in which our ability to travel anywhere at any time generates an unrelenting sameness on all places. One observer calls this mono-chromatic pattern of building the 'geography of nowhere'.

As the church, we are not immune to this feature of American life, and we will not overcome it by challenging our members all to move within a mile of the church so as to artificially recreate the parish. At the same time, we recognize the way in which our lack of geographical proximity to each other dilutes not only the quality of our relationships but also the power of the fellowship to form us deeply into the body of Christ.

We are committed, therefore, to promoting geographic proximity in our Community Groups. If possible, we would like to encourage you to attend a group near where you live. We have groups that meet all over the city, and we are always adding more groups so that we can extend the fellowship of the body of Christ to more and more people in the city of Pittsburgh. 


Youth Ministry

Agape Year

"I realize that at the beginning of the year I didn't actually TRUST God."

Trust is really hard. Trust is often harder than belief.

As we said goodbye to Tessa and Kieran at the completion of their time with Agape Year, we spent a good amount of time and energy debriefing the year. Our friend Austin Gohn, author of A Restless Age: How Saint Augustine Helps You Make Sense of Your Twenties shared with our Fellows that we don't learn from experiences, we learn from reflection.

So, we reflected on our year. We asked a lot of questions about what was hard, what was formative, how they had grown and been challenged, and asked them about the things that they learned about themselves.

And one of our Fellows shared the above quote, that they realize now that they didn't actually trust God. Early in the fall we spent a lot of time studying the Nicene Creed. One of the exercises that Erika ran the Fellows through was replacing the words "I Believe" in the Creed, to "I Trust", and "I Love". They commented that saying, "I Believe in One God, the Father, the Almighty" came a lot easier than saying "I trust." They found that belief in and trust in are not the same. And so, through a challenging year and the grace of God, their belief was transformed into trust.

Trust is really hard. Trust is often harder than belief. In May, the Rev. Frank Bernardi invited the children to jump off of a piano stool and into his arms. Now, the kids could have staved safe on the bench and said that they believed Frank would catch them. But trusting Frank required actually jumping off the bench.

Tessa and Kieran jumped into a life of trust in God this year. They trusted Him as they walked into new and uncomfortable places and ministries. They trusted Him as they ventured far from home in Thailand. And they are trusting Him as they venture forth into college and young adulthood.



Renée and Ardath Smith are sisters who have supported cross-cultural workers in their spiritual lives since the 1990s. In 2010 they began joining with others to form a Christian community devoted to worship and prayer, serving those serving God: *Hineni House*.

is a Hebrew word translated "Here I am" or "Here am I" It's about being here, close by, present, but also about readiness, awareness, awakeness.

Worship in Beauty

Hineni House worship is drawn from the treasure of the historic Christian faith and shaped by the beauty of Anglican and contemplative traditions. It is also impacted by dynamic worship characteristics of prayer movements around the world.

Prayer in Action

Called to prayer and engagement in a variety of prayer-related ministries, Hineni members provide spiritual direction, healing prayer, deeper discipleship through prayer workshop and training venues, and one-on-one prayer mentoring.

Serving Those Serving God

Difficult life dynamics take on greater intensity in a foreign context. Cross-cultural workers require in-depth support in order to survive and thrive in their callings – both on the field and when they return to their home countries. With over 65 years of combined ministry working in a variety of agencies, Hineni community members have seen time and again the core need of those who minister is an ever-deepening communion with Jesus.

Ardath and Renée have moved into a former B&B located in McDonald, PA – a lovely place for ministry to cross-cultural workers and others in local leadership and congregations. Your prayers are appreciated as they settle in to new life and ministry opportunities, and for finances related to establishing *Hineni House* in McDonald, PA

Ann Paton's sermon on February 25, 2018 (available on Ascension's website) explained the biblical word *Hineni* within the context of Abraham's story. This Hebrew word translated 'HERE AM I', is richly layered in meaning. It expresses attentiveness, responsiveness, listening and waiting, imploring and agreeing, acting on God's directives, moving forward in God's authority. This radical availability is what Hineni community members call the "Hineni Posture". It has become their core commitment as a community and a transformative spiritual practice.
