rowing up in England in the 60's and 70's, I remember bomb-drills at school, from the threats of the IRA; power-cuts every week, the effects of an oil crisis and coal-miners' strike. 
I have had the great privilege of serving as rector of Ascension since 2004. I love my job. It's hard to describe in a few words what I "do" as rector, given the wide variety of responsibilities and opportunities that come my way. An analogy I sometimes use is that of Ascension being a bit like an aircraft carrier. A carrier is a launching pad for critical missions, a vibrant community, a mess hall, a hospital, and so much more. I get to serve on the bridge overseeing everything with an amazing crew. It's a vocation, a calling, a way of life. It demands my best efforts and my dependence on the Lord, who is the true captain of the ship.

As rector, I also come alongside people of all ages and stages of life – in the mundane and the extraordinary, in times of joy or sorrow. In my own life, I have known times of great sadness but through it all I have experienced the extraordinary love of God and the wonderful love and support of my Ascension family, whom I cherish.

What a joy it is to share the grace of God with others on a daily basis. One of the verses of Scripture that I learned as a boy, remains with me as a challenge and an encouragement in my life and work: "Have I not commanded you? Be strong and courageous. One book I am going to be re-reading, and I have recommended before, is Mark Buchanan's <u>The Rest of God</u>, <u>Restoring Your Soul by Restoring Sabbath</u>. (Thomas Nelson, 2007 - 223 pages.) In the light of our current situation nationally, and my own personal awakening to racial tensions and injustices, I also commend to you two other books. Both are very challenging. Both may make you feel uncomfortable. Both are well worth reading: <u>The Color of Compromise, The Truth about the American Church's Complicity in Racism</u> by Jemar Tisby. (Zondervan, 2019 – 250 pages); and <u>I'm Still</u> <u>Here, Black Dignity in a World Made</u> for Whiteness by Austin Channing Brown. (Convergent Books, 2018 – 175 pages). I found this to be a very challenging read.

was born a Preacher's Kid in rural Minnesota and spent my childhood mostly in rural settings like South Dakota and the Upper Peninsula of Michigan. After graduating from Calvin College, I worked for the Coalition for Christian Outreach for 15 years, serving as a campus minister at Youngstown State University and then as a staff supervisor and staff trainer.

I was delighted to receive a phone call from Jonathan Millard in 2005 inviting me to join the staff as Director of Children's Ministry! In 2006 I transitioned to the position of Parish Administrator. In 2015 I shifted positions again and now serve as Director of Ministry.

grew up in Dover, PA, the son of an elementary school guidance counselor (my mom) and a Baptist music minister (my dad), and it's no exaggeration to say that I grew up in the church and surrounded by music. I first banged on a drum set when I was five or six years old, started dabbling with writing music while in high school, and studied music composition at West Chester University. Even though I grew up in the church and in a Christian home, it was in college that I really started taking my faith seriously. It was also then that I first encountered one of the great questions of my life: Am I called to music, or ministry? What I thought I knew for sure was that, whatever I was called to, it most likely wasn't music ministry.

An internship with a campus ministry brought me to Pittsburgh in 2003, and after years of working more odd jobs than is advisable, I found myself married to my lovely wife, working sporadically as a freelance composer and worshipping here at Church of the Ascension. (The decision to put down roots at Ascension was actually a very prayerful one, but that's a story for another time.) Elise and I got involved with the 9:00 am music team right away, and the opportunity to serve in a leadership role came a year or two later when I was invited to serve as Interim Assistant Music Minister. Even though it's not what I thought I wanted to do—in fact, I had kind of been avoiding it—I loved music ministry from day one. The calling came through the process of serving.

As my role has continued to shift over the last five years, it's been a joy to see how the various pieces of my background can be used to serve the church. There's more crossover between Baptist and Anglican hymnody than one might think, and the combination of conducting lessons from college and my experience writing for and working with choirs has equipped me in ways I never could have expected.

It's worth mentioning that, during this unusual season, the music and arts ministry has had to morph and reorient itself many times over. There are still opportunities to serve, but health concerns particularly concerns over the dangers of singing—have forced us to think outside the box. If you are a musician, a poet, a visual artist, or are otherwise artistically inclined, please reach out to me. We may not be able to serve in some of the usual ways, but the opportunities are still there if we're willing to look.

My role here at Ascension is, in the best sense of the word, collaborative. In addition to serving alongside my wife, Elise, it's also my pleasure to serve with **Jane Banfield Hicks** as the children's choir director. Jane brings a lot of wisdom and enthusiasm to her role, and I can't wait to see where the children's choir goes from here.

I'm also delighted to continue serving with **Jeanne Kohn**. Jeanne has served Ascension for over 26 years, and it's been a joy to collaborate with her during my time on staff. The fact that she has agreed to continue serving as organist and choir accompanist is a blessing to me and to the Ascension family as a whole.

o quote Lennon-McCartney, it's been a "long and winding road" of faith. I grew up in Oakmont, PA and had established my entire identity as a vocalist. In April 1999 at age 15, I surrendered my life to Christ while attending an Assembly of God Fine Arts Convention. That same July, I was accepted into the prestigious Interlochen Arts Academy for Classical Voice, only to have my acceptance revoked when I was diagnosed with a vocal injury two weeks later. Unable to sing for a year, I was absolutely shattered and felt abandoned by God. I faced the choice to either betray my Savior in anger or suffer through a tremendous identity crisis alone. By God's grace, I chose to suffer with Him as he dismantled my identity and idolatry, and rebuilt a foundation of faith that rested in Him alone.

After college, I served with Youth With A Mission - Music & Worship Arts (New Zealand/Fiji) where I first experienced the beauty of people from all over the globe worshipping in their diverse cultures with unity of spirit. I returned to the United States to work in behavior health and special education, while serving as a music minister in a local church. In 2013, my husband Chris and I visited Ascension after praying to find a church that was liturgical and charismatic (tall order, eh?). In addition to joining Ascension staff in July 2019, I also work at Duquesne University, and am a mom to an active 4-year old! It's a full life!

As Assistant Director and one of the ministry's vocal leaders, I echo the Psalmist's exhortation: "O magnify the Lord with me, and let us exalt his name together." (Psalm 34:3) My hope is to empower other vocalists to do this by integrating their heart (emotion), mind (truth), soul (identity), and strength (skill/technique).

I feel particularly humbled and overjoyed when I have the opportunity to hear stories and walk alongside artists of all disciplines as they seek to serve the Lord in the church and in their community. I get to see this regularly in two Ascension ministries: the Ascension Songwriters Collaborative and Wrought Iron Worship (Ascension's interdisciplinary arts collective). I also serve as the Pittsburgh local retreat leader for United Adoration, a global organization that strives "to help local churches release their artists to show the wonder and beauty of God through the sacred arts and song". Leah Hornfeck Assoc. for Youth & College Ministry





was born in Pittsburgh and grew up in Chippewa township, just outside of Beaver Falls in Northwest PA, with my parents and younger brother. Though we went to church semi-regularly throughout my childhood, it wasn't until my senior year of high school that I truly began following Christ. A teammate on my high school volleyball team who had a strong faith and love for God helped me see what it meant to have a relationship with Jesus, and he radically turned my life upside down.

I then attended Duquesne University where I received my Bachelor of Science in Athletic Training. However, during my time in college and through my leadership roles in a campus ministry called Crossroads, I felt that God was calling me to work in ministry. Spring semester of my senior year, I applied and was accepted to the CCO Fellowship Program with the intent of further discerning my call to ministry. Upon graduation, I spent a year ministering to college students at Slippery Rock University and being mentored by a veteran CCO staff member. Throughout that time God affirmed that this was indeed the work he was calling me to do.

I began pursuing what the CCO calls "career staff" positions, and that's when I was first introduced to Church of the Ascension. I had heard wonderful things about this church and was very interested in the possibility of working with students in Pittsburgh, the city I had come to love and know as home. I also was intrigued and excited by the position's emphasis on helping students transition into and from college. Thankfully, Ascension seemed to like me too, and they brought me on through their partnership with the CCO in June of 2018.

Since then, I have been continuing my work as CCO staff, ministering to students at University of Pittsburgh and Carnegie Mellon University in partnership with Church of the Ascension, where I also work with high school students in the Church of the Ascension Youth Group (CAYG). Our CCO-Ascension campus ministry, now called Venite, has taken many shapes and forms in my two years here. We are certainly still finding ourselves and learning how to build a new, unique ministry amidst so many other established groups, but we've made great strides. Our vision is to "invite college students into a deeper understanding of the Gospel, a broader vision of God's Kingdom, and richer relationships within the diversity of Christ's body at Church of the Ascension and beyond." We've done this through student-led Bible studies, monthly Sunday brunches, on-campus midday prayer meetings, attending the CCO's Jubilee conference, and more.

Of course, many of these things are no longer possible and there is much in flux due to the COVID-19 pandemic. However, I do have one very exciting piece of news to share with you regarding the 2020-2021 academic year. This year, I will have a CCO Fellow who will be joining me in working with college students through Venite! I mentioned going through the CCO Fellowship Program after my senior year of college, but to give you a bit more information about it, this is a one-year opportunity to minister to college students while being mentored by an experienced CCO staff member. The fellowship pro-gram provides intensive Biblical and ministry training, intentional opportunities for growth and ministry experience, and much more. At the end of the fellowship year, Fellows have the opportunity to continue into the career track of full-time campus ministry staff with the CCO. My Fellow is Christopher Kirkland, who earned his undergraduate degree in History from Washington and Lee University, then his M.Div. from Trinity School for Ministry. Here is a bit of what Chris has to say about his desire to minister to college students through the CCO:

"During my own time in college, I owed a lot to the people who invested their time and wisdom into my own struggles. I hope to offer students similar guidance, drawing on the full counsel of Scripture and Christian tradition. Going into campus ministry, I wanted to help bridge the divide between campus and church and I think CCO does that the best."

Chris will be joining us onsite in early August, after completing his CCO New Staff Training. It would mean the world to know that you are praying for him, our students, and the work we'll be doing through Venite during this unprecedented, upcoming school year.

Alex Banfield Hicks Director of Youth & College Ministry



grew up amongst the rolling hills of England's West Country and in 1999 matriculated at the University of Oxford to study modern history. My cynical atheism began to soften after I joined the Merton College Chapel Choir, and my interest in Christianity was piqued further while studying the lives of early British saints. Ascension Fellows

hurch of the Ascension is launching a new ministry initiative this September called the Ascension Fellows Program. This is a leadership formation program focused on mentoring and training potential new clergy. The program will be run in partnership with the Anglican Diocese of Pittsburgh Curacy Initiative which has provided partial funding. Our fellows will essentially be doing a 'residency', just like newly minted doctors do hospital residencies to gain valuable expertise. The fellows are here to gain on the ground experience and broad exposure to all aspects of church ministry and leadership.

Our hope is that the Ascension Fellows Program will develop a pipeline of new leaders with significant ministry experience who ideally continue to serve at Ascension when their time in the program comes to a close, or who may be in a good position to lead an Ascension church plant. Of course, the fellows may be called by our Lord to work in another Anglican parish not affiliated with Ascension. The fellows will gain ministry exposure in a multi-staff church as well as mentoring, support and formation as they move toward full-time ordained ministry. The dream is to begin with two fellows this fall and grow this program over the next decade so that Ascension provides a stream of vibrant, young leadership.

In addition to broad exposure to parish life, Ascension Fellows will be deployed in one or two primary areas of ministry. Our first two fellows will be active in the teaching and discipleship component of our international and young adult ministries. In addition to a primary ministry focus, the fellows will also be regular attendees of our staff meetings and will rotate on and off other ministries throughout their time with us, for example assisting in areas such as the altar guild, welcome ministries, baptismal and confirmation preparation, and so on. The goal is to give our fellows broad and comprehensive exposure to the ministry of an active Anglican church while also deploying them in targeted ways.

With that preamble, we are happy to introduce **Josh and Jess Bennett** to the Ascension church family. They have accepted our offer to become our first two fellows beginning September 1st. They are married and both graduated with M.Div. degrees from Trinity School for Ministry in the spring. They come to us highly recommended. While they both want to enter into discernment as to whether to be ordained to the Anglican priesthood, they are currently members and staff of Allegheny Center Alliance Church where they served in youth ministry for several years in tandem with the completion of their degrees and growth of their young family.
