Advent at Ascension

Greetings in the Name of the Lord.

ith all we have been through in this past year, many of us are longing for a reset. While the struggles, hardships and losses of this year have been enormous (and likely will continue), the Church offers a timely invitation for recalibration – Advent.

Advent is a season of waiting and longing, anticipation and hope. It looks back to the first coming of Jesus in the incarnation and looks forward to the second coming of Jesus for the culmination of all things – when God's justice, mercy, and love will be seen for all peoples and all creation.

The pandemic has certainly caused deep yearning and longing. Almost no one has been untouched. Perhaps this Advent, even as we lament, we can also long with eager anticipation and great hope for Jesus – the one who was born in time and who will come again in victory. The lamenting and longing are vital parts of the Advent journey. The liturgical new year, that begins with the Advent promise of the Messiah, may be exactly what we need, now more than ever as this very difficult calendar year comes to a close.

In the wake of the loss, uncertainty and despair of 2020, we can take our stand and reaffirm that "Jesus is Lord!" We set our hope on him.

Hope is powerful. Hope in Jesus turns darkness to light. In this season of Advent, we have an opportunity to give ourselves more fully to reflection and contemplation. One thing you might do as you look back on 2020 is to ask yourself, "Where does hope in Jesus touch my soul?" and

"Where does my hope in Jesus bring light and love into the world?"


In addition to these questions, we have a variety of reflection and contemplation resources for you to use as you enter into the rhythms of Advent this year:

- Advent Wreaths (see article on pg 5.)


One beautiful part of Advent is that many of the daily readings focus on the Book of Isaiah. Isaiah, almost more than any other prophet, expresses depths of yearning alongside expectation and hope for deliverance. For example, Isaiah 40 reads:

"Comfort, comfort my people, says your God..." "In the wilderness prepare the way for the Lord; make straight in the desert a highway for our God. Every valley shall be raised up, every mountain and hill made low; the rough ground shall become level, the rugged places a plain. And the glory of the Lord will be revealed, and all people will see it together. For the mouth of the Lord has spoken."

My Advent prayer for each of you is that God will meet you at your point of deepest longing and greatest need and that you will be able to rejoice in the greatest gift given – Jesus our Messiah. It is the birth of this child wherein lies our one true hope.



Advent & Christmas Worship Services



Sundays in Advent (November 29; December 6, 13, 20)

We will continue to livestream a 10:00 am service with walk through eucharist throughout Advent. In person worship, both in the Nave and in the Parish Hall, will continue to be offered and registration will be required. We will not have a Service of Lessons & Carols this year. However, we will have a time for singing Advent Carols prior to the service outside from 9:00 – 9:35 am. We hope to procure a tent for all of our Sundays in Advent so that socializing outside after services can continue come rain or shine!

LIVE NATIVITY on Sunday, December 20

After the service on Sunday, December 20th, we are happy to announce that we will have a live nativity, replete with real animals (lambs, sheep, goats, a calf, donkeys and even something in the camel family!) Children (and adults!) are invited to come in costume. We do hope to see many shepherds and angels and other characters from Bethlehem on our church lawn. We hope to add outdoor caroling (with masks), fire pits and maybe even some hot food and drink, individually served. Details to come!

Quiet (tech-free) Services in Advent

During Advent, we will offer a quiet and simple service of Holy Eucharist on Wednesdays at Noon. There will be a homily and instrumental music. Registrations in advance will be helpful. Visit the same registration tab on the website currently in use for Sunday worship. Entrance will be through the red narthex doors. All COVID protocols remain in place.

Christmas Eve 4:00 pm Outdoor Service

On Christmas Eve we will hold a one-hour family friendly service outdoors, on the big Ascension lawn, hopefully under a very big tent. We will sing the great carols of Christmas (with masks on), light Christmas candles, and enjoy a frosty eucharist together! Once again, children will be invited to come in costumes depicting the Nativity story. While we will be able to accommodate more people outside safely distanced, reservations will be required. This should be a service filled with light, joy, ambiance from fire pits, and those attending will be home for dinner by 5:30 pm or so.

Christmas Eve 8:00 pm Festival Eucharist with walk through eucharist to follow

A great Ascension tradition is our Festival Eucharist. This year that service will take place at 8:00 pm and will be live streamed on our YouTube channel. Limited reservations for in person attendance will be available. If demand exists, we will also have overflow seating in the Parish Hall.

Christmas Day 10:00 am Eucharist

A service of Holy Eucharist will take place at 10:00 am. Reservations will be required. This service will not be live streamed and thus there will be no walk through eucharist.

Celebrating Advent at Home

ne of the ways we mark Advent in our services and in our homes is with the lighting of an Advent wreath. I encourage all households to purchase or make their own Advent wreath and light it each Sunday as you participate at home watching the livestream, or perhaps each evening when you are gathered for a meal.

Advent wreaths are a simple circle of four candles: three purple and one pink, with a white 'Christ Candle' in the middle. There are different understandings of the significance of the four candles which are lit on each new Sunday of Advent. One approach sees the candles as representing the Prophets, the Holy Family, the Shepherds and the Magi. Our Children's Minister, Catherine Slocum, will be distributing materials to the children using this theme. Another approach views the candles as standing for Hope, Love, Joy and Peace.

At the beginning of each of our Sunday services in Advent we will hear the words of "O Come O Come Immanuel" when the candles are lit, adding a different verse each week.

O Come, O come, Emmanuel, and ransom captive Israel, that mourns in lonely exile here until the Son of God appear.

O Come, thou Branch of Jesse's tree, free them from Satan's tyranny

that trust they mighty power to save, and give them victory o'er the grave.

O come, though Dayspring from on high, and cheer us by thy drawing nigh;

disperse the gloomy clouds of night, and death's dark shadow put to flight.

O come, Desire of nations, bind in one the hearts of all mankind:

bid thou our sad divisions cease, and be thyself our King of Peace.

REJOICE! REJOICE! Emmanuel shall come to thee, O Israel!

Imost all of us know someone who is up on all the latest technology, who unfailingly has the latest APP for his or her phone. These people often seem to be about 12 years old – but then most of the world seems quite young to me these days. I am not techno-savvy.

When I bought my iPhone, I took my nephews, Matthew and Michael (who would want me to tell you they are 27 and 24) with me to the Apple Store and said to the salesman, "I'll pay the bill, but talk to them." The lads had a time of it,

convincing the salesman, who was shocked and disappointed, that I did not need this, that, and the other APP on my phone, because I would never use it. They were completely correct.

For the past few years, I have used a different sort of APP to salutary effect. I call it the "Advent Prayer Project;" it is so low tech that it is available even to those who do not have a cell phone! It is free, and one need not even register. This is just between each of us and the Father. Here is how it works:

Pick a person or issue in need of prayer and take it on. Maybe the Father will bring a person or a matter to mind for whom or which He would like you to pray. The Scriptures are replete with instances in which someone in the Body of Christ prayed and God answered in a mighty way. See, Acts 12:1-17. Who knows what God might do in response to your prayer?!

This is not a forever commitment. Advent starts on Sunday, November 29, and ends Christmas Eve, Thursday, December 24. That makes twenty-six days to take some particular person or matter to the Father every day. Please join me in this APP and let's watch for God's answers to our prayer.

Christmas Tree Food Drive



The Gift of Oneself

I was reading in 1 Peter this morning and was struck by Peter's call in 5:10; "As each has received a gift, use it to serve one another, as good stewards of God's varied grace." It's a beautiful, humbling and emboldening reminder that we all have received gifts and that we can serve one another. We don't 'own' these gifts but are stewards of this varied grace from God. It belongs to Him, just as we do as his creation.

It connected me with another idea I heard the day before. The Barna Group's Mark Matlock described Millennials as a "generation who don't want to be consumers, they want to contribute." I have been encouraged by three recent examples of mentormentee relationships established between 20-something Millennials and high-schoolers. All girls in fact. Maybe that's not surprising.

All that to say, in this season in which Ascension's youth group can't do the big old gatherings in our basement, in which many people are socially isolated and 'living online', and in which the Porch Pods are getting chillier, the value of mentoring, chatting, praying with a real person seems greater than ever.

I remember learning in seminary that the ideal mentor is about ten to fifteen years older. That is close enough to still relate but far enough along the path of life to have some real insights to share. I remember fondly how much I looked up to and admired folks who invested in me, their wisdom and care shining brightly, and then I realized these esteemed mentors were younger than I am now!

Fostering Prayerful Habits: BCP 2019 Daily Office App

published the web app dailyoffice2019.com nearly a year ago to make it easier to pray the Daily Office on the go using the new 2019 edition of the Book of Common Prayer. Now it is also available as a fullyoffline iPhone/iPad app and will soon be released as an Android app.

Regularly praying the Daily Office -- morning and evening prayer -- can bear so much fruit. It unites us with the church around the world as we pray using ancient patterns of daily prayer. It lets us hear God speak through his word, walking through the entirety of sacred scripture each year. It bookends our day, helping us make time for God when we might otherwise be too busy or too tired.

But for all of this to really work, the Daily Office must be a regular habit like brushing our teeth. It's that repetition that instills a habit of holiness.

The Daily Office website and app are designed to make that habit as attainable as possible.

For me, praying the Daily Office from a printed Book of Common Prayer with a Bible in hand and my phone silenced is always better. But more important is actually doing it. The app is great for when you are out and about without a book -- maybe on a lunch break, outside in a park, or even in bed at night when the lights are already out (it has a dark mode!). It's meant to be used at any time or in any place you may find yourself.

Therefore, the app is designed with several principles in mind:

Faithfulness to the BCP

The app is designed to be faithful to the Book of Common Prayer, 2019, following the exact text and rubrics. You can pray interchangeably from the app or the book. Scripture is taken from the English Standard Version, the standard text of the Anglican Church in North America.

Flexibility

The app allows you to jump in and start praying without setting anything up. But if you have specific preferences, the Settings

page allows you to choose from nearly any option allowed by the Book of Common Prayer.

Distraction-free simplicity

There are no page-flips, and there is no need to look up the calendar or readings. There are intentionally no inline options so you don't have to pause to figure out how to do it after you've started praying. (If you prefer different options, you can select them in advance.)

Book-like

The app tries to recreate the feel of the book, including the font, alignment, and layout. One of



the best aspects of the 2019 BCP is how easy and beautiful it is to read. (A page flip option is coming soon to make it feel more like a book or Kindle).

Coming Soon

A bunch of new features are in the works: a Google Play/Android app, a smaller sized app for iPhone, the texts of the traditional language edition, a spoken audio version, optional chant notations for psalms and canticles, additional Bible translations, and more. International Ministry: Preparing for the Messiah

n the International Ministry, some of our Bible studies are going through the wonderful stories of the Old Testament and recounting how the Messiah was promised 4,000 year ago. It is a perfect backdrop to Advent and preparing for the Messiah in our hearts. Meg Sateia and Josh Bennett, who co-teach a Bible class of 10 students on Monday morning, write the following:

In our study of Jesus and the Old Testament this fall we have been pleased to see that our group has not been shying away from tough questions. They are not asking questions in an argumentative way, but simply being open to fully engaging with the text. We have also enjoyed their willingness to open up and share about their own lives in deeper ways than we expected. We believe the students are benefiting from having connection with each other during this time of isolation, and hope that they are also benefiting from digging deeply into Scripture both with their minds and hearts. Since we have people with various levels of familiarity with the Bible, some have been able to share their knowledge and wisdom and others have been able to share their fresh eyes, and the result is that we have all been growing together in our understanding of the Word. We feel humbled and privileged to get to study God's word with people from all different corners of the world.

We are thankful for God's provision of leaders for the six Bible studies running weekly via Zoom, and the physical provision for field trips. We are also grateful that this fall we were able to watch thought-provoking movies (like Bella) here at the church, and to have some other fun events (like painting and drinking hot chocolate with Suzanne Werder in the parish hall!)

In October, fourteen internationals spent an amazing day at Frank Lloyd Wright's Fallingwater. The scenery in the purple meadow where we ate lunch was breathtaking, and students commented on how grateful they felt to be on the trip to see the autumn leaves. Most importantly, outdoor trips like these

allow precious time to meet in person. We are thankful to Amy Holcombe, Carolina and Francisco Tufino, and the Bohn March family (all newcomers to Ascension this fall!) for driving to this event.

Later in October a smaller group of students biked along the rivers and learned about the historical significance of the Northside and enjoying the public art of Randyland. In early November we had an Autumn/Thanksgiving lunch outside with traditional foods and games on the lawn with teachers, volunteers and students—all feasting on Denise Bozich's cooking. Yum!
