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Epiphany: The Light of Christ

Two New Partnerships

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Ascension's international ministry, under the direction of LuAnn Pengidore, serves people in three broad categories: graduate students and their spouses; professionals and their spouses; low-income immigrant and refugee families. It is this latter group which comes to us needing help – financial, medical, employment, legal, practical. From finding inexpensive cars and good car seats, to finding rides for job interviews or lawyer appointments, we have only dipped our toes into these waters. It takes coordination, resources, and time to come alongside. Building relationship is key.

Pittsburgh is a destination city for refugees and immigrants. There are significant Nepali, Burmese, Chinese, Latino, Russian-speaking, Congolese, Indian, Iraqi, Somali, Syrian, and more recently, Afghani immigrant populations. Ascension currently has refugees from several countries actively engaged in our program. We have 4 refugees from Cameroon, India, Afghanistan, and Nepal, for whom we purchased Chromebooks for online classes, helped with job needs and childcare, and linked with classes, conversation partners, and counseling. We have other low-income immigrants from Rwanda, the Congo, Guatemala, Argentina, Venezuela, Columbia, Ecuador, and Iran who are actively involved with classes and field trips.

In the past few months, we were approached by representatives of two non-profit entities, the *Christian Immigration Advocacy Center* (CIAC) and the *Society of Anglican Missionaries and Senders* (SAMS). Both want to enter partnerships with Ascension. Both presented us with a ministry vision directed toward refugees and low-income immigrants. Both entail pilot programs. Both are full of wonderful possibilities.

The *Christian Immigration Advocacy Center* has offices on the north side of Pittsburgh and approached Ascension to develop a satellite office on the east side. Jennifer Bright Tinker is an Ascension parishioner who is also an

experienced immigration lawyer. Jennifer has been our liaison with CIAC leadership - indeed she is the champion for this initiative - and together we have been working out an agreement as to what it would look like for our church to host and staff an eastern satellite office.

CIAC's Mission (www.ciacpgh.org) is to provide high-quality legal services in a compassionate, incarnational, and culturally appropriate way, empowering churches to serve their poorest neighbors well through collaborative partnerships. CIAC primarily serves low-income individuals and families in need of immigration legal services surrounding green cards, naturalization, family reunification, asylum claims and other related immigration matters.

Rather than build a large infrastructure first, beginning in October 2021 we decided to test launch a Wednesday legal clinic that runs at the same time as evening English classes to gauge demand as well as ministry needs on our end. We took these initial steps with an agreement that CIAC will provide malpractice insurance to our legal volunteers and give us access to their bank of documentation and forms. Ascension provides volunteer legal personnel who direct clients toward resources. Complicated cases are referred to CIAC lawyers in the main office for more help.

With just one email to English class participants, the three appointments for our first clinic in October filled up immediately. Issues dealt with on that evening included affirmative asylum, removal of conditions when married to a US citizen, Violence Against Women Act, temporary protected status, B1/B2 tourist visas, and consular processing. Since its start up, Jennifer Tinker has recruited a volunteer administrator, Kathleen Oliver, to assist with client intake.

We are still very much in process. We have not developed a schedule or come to agreement for fees payable to CIAC for clients we refer. We don't have a consultative structure in place for evaluation and decisions regarding scholarships. We also don't have income guidelines set up to determine levels of assistance. While we have applications pending, we have not as yet secured ongoing funding! For now, we're glad to be off to a great start. As the international ministry has already proved so well, we appear to have a congregation easily motivated to volunteer with internationals. Providing this opportunity to our members in the legal profession seems like an easy win and a great way to expand our current ministry in a vital new direction.

It bears mentioning that Ascension already has strong links to Christian medical institutions that serve the poor and non-English speakers, notably East Liberty Family Health Care Center, founded by one of our members, Dr. David Hall. Adding CIAC is very appealing. The ability to teach immigrants and refugees English, to assist them legally, to refer them to Christian medical care, and to invite them into the life of our congregation and introduce them to Jesus if they so choose, provides a type of whole person care that we very much desire. This vision excites us. It is a robust embodiment of the tagline of our *More than Stones* campaign – *welcoming our neighbors and reaching the nations*. The initiative to follow enhances this even more.

Introducing Daniel and Rebekah Behrens



In August of 2021 we were approached by Denise Cox, Associate Director of the *Society of Anglican Missionaries and Senders* (SAMS) to consider a partnership with Daniel and Rebekah Behrens who hoped to relocate to the northern United States from their

ministry with *Trinity on the Border* (www.thebordermission.org) in Texas to come alongside refugees and poor immigrants permanently settling in cities. The Behrens have a call to work with refugees and low-income immigrants and felt a pull from

the Holy Spirit to live and minister in a city where immigrants are settling for the long-term, rather than come alongside them on the Texas border which is very much a transit point.

The Behrens went through a discernment process with SAMS and have been accepted as candidates for a pilot project in Pittsburgh. They moved to Pittsburgh in December with the hope that, with Ascension as a partner, they will build out an inland refugee/immigrant ministry program that the entire Anglican Church in North America (ACNA) can learn from. They are seeking agreements and the blessing of their sending church, St. Peter's in Tallahassee, Florida; the Bishop of the Gulf Atlantic where Daniel is canonically resident as an ordained Anglican priest; the Bishop of Pittsburgh; and, of course, Church of the Ascension which will function as their home base. While they do not anticipate obstacles, agreements are not currently fixed, so this is very much a work in progress.



Daniel and Rebekah and their children worshipped with us on Christmas Eve! In terms of their upcoming timetable, the first half of 2022 will be a time of transition. They will have three months of training with SAMS and will focus their efforts on support raising. The Behrens will also use the first half of 2022 to understand Pittsburgh, particularly where primary immigrant communities are located, with the goal of moving into such a community. They will begin attending Ascension to understand what ministry to our poorer immigrants already exists and begin relationship building with program leaders and the Ascension family generally. They will also be welcoming their third child in June!

This spring SAMS will also send Daniel and Rebekah to Dallas in March to observe one of the best church refugee ministries in the United States, *Gateway of Grace* (www.gatewayofgrace.org), established in an Episcopal Church by Samira Page who was herself an Iranian refugee. The vision of Gateway of Grace is to see the practical and spiritual needs of refugees in their communities met through the Gateway of Grace services and compassionate and meaningful relationships with Gateway of Grace volunteers. An extensive ministry with administrative and communication supports has been built out. A few of us from Ascension hope to join them on that trip.

What will the Behrens' ministry look like as they minister with us as "missionaries in residence"? At this point we don't know but there are manifold possibilities. We do know that they come with an incarnational vision – life on life with relational bridges being key. We have broached the possibilities of starting an Evening Prayer service in Spanish, providing transportation to classes, developing a mentoring or after-school program for children of immigrants, establishing an off-site chapel in a strategic location. Our hope is that they will build out ministry and programming in new and innovative ways, building a team along the way to complement all the good ministry already happening - there are currently 50+ adults regularly volunteering with international ministry. I have every confidence that the Ascension family will come alongside this new work with enthusiasm.

Revelation 7:9 Ministry

The Apostle John had a dream on the island of Patmos. Revelation 7:9 reads, "After this I looked, and there before me was a great multitude that no one could count, from every nation, tribe, people and language, standing before the throne and before the Lamb." In fact, this is our Lord's dream. One day it will be a wonderful reality. We want to participate in that dream in the here and now, developing a foretaste of that vision with a coordinated, multi-faceted ministry that serves as an example to the whole church, particularly within our diocese and ultimately to the Anglican Church in North America. It is a vision full of life, beauty, and hope. Through these partnerships we hope to move more fully into that dream and behold together as vision comes to life.

Be the Light

- You can offer to pick up a family that does not have a car for a field trip or worship service.
- You can join in our 15-minute prayer time for internationals on Mondays at 4:00 pm via Zoom. To get the link, email sophiedbernardi@gmail.com.
- You can be a conversation partner with an international or with a small group of internationals, in person or on Zoom.
- You can donate an old laptop for internationals who only have a phone for online classes.
- You can visit some moms with new babies that are homebound.
- You can cook with internationals for EECM.



Thank you for already being a bright light to so many internationals. One student from Japan who comes to the services commented that six people from Ascension asked her to Thanksgiving dinner and she was really blessed by that. A Spotlight on Foundations

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On the Feast of Epiphany (January 6), we celebrate the revelation of Jesus to the whole world. Our word epiphany comes from the Greek *epiphainō*, which means “to appear or make known.” During Epiphanytide, we remember how Jesus was made known to the nations as a baby (Matthew 2:1-12) when the magi come from the East to worship him. We remember how the light of Christ shone in each of our lives. We remind ourselves of the great call to shine as Christ’s light in the world.

As we embark on a new year together, Ascension is offering a spiritual formation opportunity called Foundations. The goal of Foundations is to help us better know and love and live the light of Christ. I want to share more about it and why you should consider joining us.

In his book *The Rise of Christianity*, the historian Rodney Stark describes how the church progressed from an obscure and marginal movement making up just .002% of the population of the Roman Empire in 47 AD to over 55% by the year 350 AD. Over the course of three centuries, there was an

explosion of church growth. People were converting and getting baptized. Their religious allegiances were shifting from the Judaism of the Old Covenant or the Roman pantheon to Jesus and the New Covenant. But, as they say: “you can take the pagan out of pantheon but it’s hard to take the pantheon out of the Christian.”

Although their beliefs had changed, their desires, imaginations, and fundamental assumptions about the world were still in need of conversion. Our aim is that how we think, live, and love would be shaped more by the transformative story of the gospel than deformative stories of our culture. Of course, this process is a lifelong journey, but it doesn’t happen by accident.

To facilitate this kind of holistic formation, the church developed a process of catechesis. Catechesis derives from the Greek word *katecheō*, which means “to teach or instruct.” Catechesis, then, is the foundational instruction in Christian belief and practice. This is one of the many resources or methods we have available to help us grow as disciples of Jesus.

Foundations adopts the classic catechesis model. That means it covers the Lord’s Prayer, the Ten Commandments, the Apostles’ Creed,

the sacraments as well as Anglican history. The course will include 12 sessions and will be led by Father Kevin and Josh Bennett with the hope of other clergy teaching as they are able.

Perhaps the best way to think of Foundations is as a discipleship cohort or a Community Group with a semester long commitment. In addition to covering the foundational content of the Christian faith, participants will be expected to meet a few times throughout the semester with 2-3 fellow members to share and pray for one another.

Foundations is open to everyone, but space will be limited, and we ask folks to join who can commit to missing no more than two sessions. We will meet on Thursday evenings from 7:00-9:00 pm at Ascension starting in mid to late January. There will be a link for you to sign up. Check out News & Events at www.ascensionpittsburgh.org.

Whether you are brand new to Ascension or you've been around for 50 years and want a refresher, this course is for you and we hope you will consider joining us! If you can't make it this spring, we'll be offering it again in the fall.

Special Needs Ministry

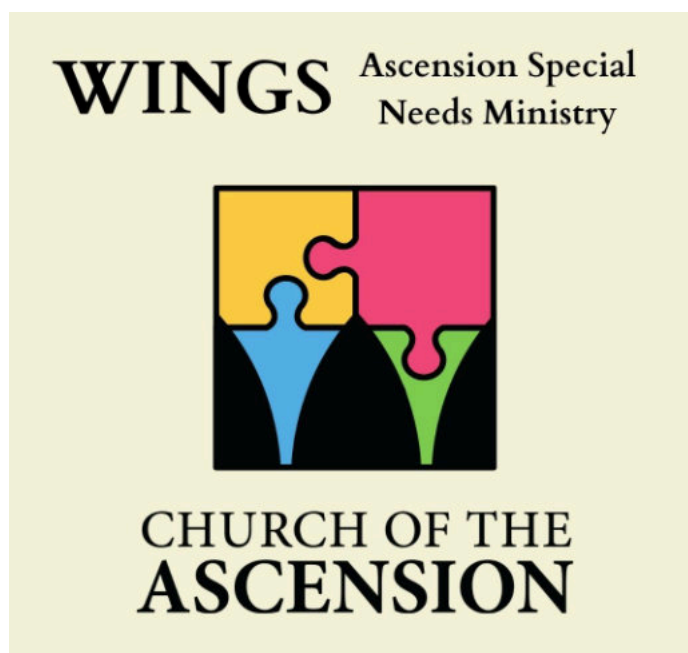

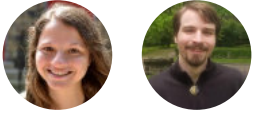

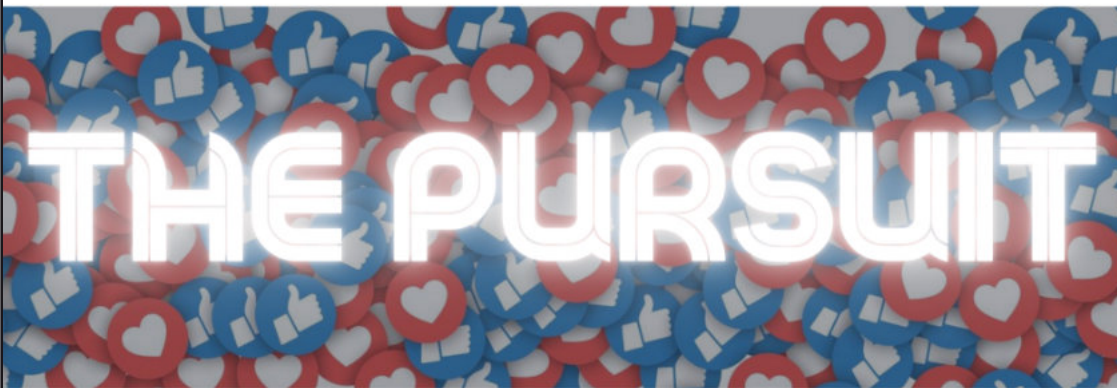
Church of the Ascension Youth Group: The Pursuit

A s a newly minted American citizen, I can now fully claim my right to life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness. But should I? And is the pursuit of happiness a wise venture for us to engage in? It is certainly something we are obsessed with, and since 2012 the United Nations has run an annual survey called the World Happiness Report. This year the United States came in at number 14.

Moreover, this obsession with happiness has been put on steroids by social media. In her book, *The Happiness Effect*, author Donna Freitas writes that young people “face enormous pressure to look perfect online - not just happy, but blissful, ecstatic, and fabulously successful. Unable to achieve this impossible standard, they are anxious about letting the less-than-perfect parts of themselves become public.”

The inevitable comparisons that we make on social media drive us to assume that the

ingredients for happiness highlighted online - how we look, the things we get to experience or achieve - must necessarily be what we must pursue as we pursue happiness. But what if this was all profoundly wrong and misdirected, leading to isolation, depression and distorted lives and relationships? What might our creator say if he walked amongst us?

Instead of the pursuit of happiness, Jesus calls us to seek first His Kingdom and his righteousness, trusting Him for all our other needs. The Sermon on the Mount gives the clearest and most striking exposition of how to live the good life, Jesus' way. So, starting from Sunday January 23, Church of the Ascension's Youth Group (CAYG) will be beginning a new series called “The Pursuit”.

Nathan Van Patter, visual artist



“I’m a local artist making a show about my neighborhood in the Mon Valley to be shown,

about a mile from my house, at a gallery in Braddock, Pennsylvania. Spending most of my life in low church settings, coming to Ascension and being part of the Christian high church inheritance has added new language to the way I paint. While my work has skewed towards the dark and gritty, I’ve received the visual language of the sanctuary and rituals as a new conversation partner. I’ve felt much more able to include in the world of my paintings things that are brighter, have a slightly more structured composition, or are explicitly Christian. Having compelling visual inputs from church broadens the scope of my creative habits. I’ve found the best art, like the best food, comes from having the best ingredients. My life at Ascension has found its way into my art, shifting the equilibrium of my tone a little more towards light.”

“There is no higher purpose and calling in life than to praise the Lord! I speak from a life-long journey of music ministry. When the organist and musicians ‘play the words’ and

not just the notes, lives can be changed. The Lord works in music to heal and speak to His people and uses it to save the unbeliever as well.

As an example, a Jewish young man wanted to sing and was welcomed, and then was witnessed to as he did what he loved to do. He was fed and it was his love of music that led him to the Lord through His people in the music ministry.

“Love Packs” Bless Thai Children

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Recently, Ascension was able to provide funds to aid one of our mission partners, St. Andrew’s School in Chiang Mai, Thailand. Some of the funds were used to supply “Love Packs” for the families of the children attending St. Andrew’s. The packs were filled with a toy medical kit, a stationary set, and an age-appropriate book in English. Each pack had an explanation in English, Chinese and Thai explaining the gift was from the Church of the Ascension and came with photos of the Ascension team that ministered at the school during book week two years ago.

During the past several months, schools were not able to meet in person due to COVID restrictions. St. Andrew’s did provide classes online but many of the families were very stressed with small children at home as well as working from home (sounds familiar!) and strict restrictions on movements. School staff visited each student’s home dropping off the “Love Pack” and greeting the students and families. Teachers and students had not seen each other in person for months so this was an exciting visit. After the visits the school staff received many notes from families expressing their appreciation.

Funds were also used to upgrade audio/video equipment for teaching online.

St. Andrew’s School, which operates in a community that is 99.9% Buddhist, expresses its gratitude to Church of the Ascension for the church’s partnership in providing a concrete expression of God’s love during this very difficult time.

Ascension sent mission teams to Chiang Mai in January 2019 and January 2020. Once the pandemic is behind us, we hope to resume annual trips to work alongside the growing Anglican Church throughout Thailand.



Shedding Light on Dark Times: Children's Ministry 2021

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Have you ever faced a problem that you could not solve? Have you ever called upon an expert to help when something was “over your head” only to have them fail terribly in solving your dilemma? Have you ever had to use all your resources and wits and will to overcome some obstacle, to no avail? After many hours of frustrated problem solving, Jay finally received help from a non-interested electrician sent from a Home Warranty claim, who without barely entering the door, diagnosed an internal wiring problem, but no solution. Many more hours of problem solving, in a house growing ever colder, resulted in no answers and much concern as the temperature plummeted into the teens. Neighbors and knowledgeable family members and friends were consulted, to no avail.

Then after three cold days, a humble electrician answered our call for help, interrupted his holiday plans, and solved

our problem for \$75.00. The problem was an external electric line leading into our house that had been damaged in the ice storm, causing the main line to short out if loaded with anything more than a few electric lights inside the house. What joy Jay felt when the electric company came that day in late December and reconnected our electric line. And what gratitude he held toward the electrician for his honest, thoughtful solution to a problem we could not solve. Warmth and light never felt so good as the New Year came around.

Whether it is a broken vehicle, a broken body or a broken relationship or a pandemic riddled society, many of us have experienced the frustration of doing all that we can to overcome a problem, to no avail. And, it is our hope, that many of us have also experienced the joy and gratitude that have resulted from having a person, or a team of people, heal or fix the brokenness that we cannot overcome on our own.

2021 felt like an electrical problem that we could not resolve. There were times in 2021 when we felt at our wits end, unable to solve problems that we had never encountered before. However, 2021 was a year, for Church of the Ascension, full of moments of relief that made us feel both joyful and grateful.

Many people at Church of the Ascension, like that honest electrician who came to our aid, emerged amid this time of chaos and confusion to solve problems and heal broken situations. Resilient kids willing to try what had never been done before, flexible moms and dads who pivoted time and time again, talented artists, teachers and “doers” who stepped in to make up new ways to gather and learn and worship without complaint, combined to make this year one that reminded us of the promise that comes to us in James 1:2-4, “Consider it pure joy, my brothers and sisters whenever you face trials of many kinds, because you know that the testing of your faith produces perseverance. Let perseverance finish its work so that you may be mature and

complete, not lacking anything.”

With great joy and gratitude, recall with us the many instances in 2021 where we experienced resolution, restoration, and recovery in our time together as a Church.

- Weekly Activity Bins provided on Sunday mornings! Staple materials like the Sunday Paper

and crayons along with fun crafts that included Pentecost headband, stain glass cross craft, lunch sack puppets, Haitian foil crosses and button Christmas ornaments to name a few. Thank you, Katie Wentz!

- Children present songs during our worship services – *I’ve Got that Joy, Joy, Joy down in my heart, Jesus Strong and Kind, and He Has done Marvelous Things*
- Produce 5 videos on our Kids’ Church values of Grace, Kindness, Listening, Truth and Beauty (May – Aug. 2021)

- We open our nursery and begin weekly Sunday morning children’s programming Sept. 12, 2021
- Jay and Catherine Slocum develop curriculum that is immersive and uses the whole space of the Nave and Courtyard that is dynamic and fun for the children.
