

Stewarding God's Abundant Grace Introducing Ascension's Fall Preaching Series

tarting in September, the preaching team at Ascension will begin a new sermon series on the theme of *stewardship*.

Now, stick with me here! I know "stewardship" can be a loaded word. So, I want to be clear up front that this preaching series is manifestly NOT a series that is just focused on money or giving. I promise this is NOT the start of another capital campaign (Lord have mercy!).

Of course, our treasure is an essential gift that God calls us to steward, but the theme of stewardship is so much bigger than just money. For the Christian and for the Church, stewardship is about faithfully stewarding all the gifts God lavishly bestows on us.

The name of the series is "Stewarding God's Abundant Grace." The inspiration for this comes from 1 Peter 4:10:

Like good stewards of the manifold grace of God, serve one another with whatever gift each of you has received.

In this passage, the Apostle Peter calls us to be good stewards. This word "steward" is such a rich concept. In Greek, it literally means "house manager." To be a steward means to oversee or manage something that is not yours but has been entrusted to you. Stewards are not owners. Stewards are managers of the things entrusted to them. This is what we are as Christians. We are managers of the things God entrusts to us.

In the context of this passage, Peter has God's gracious gifts in mind. He goes on to write this in 1 Peter 4:11,


"Whoever speaks must do so as one speaking the very words of God; whoever serves must do so with the strength that God supplies, so that God may be glorified in all things through Jesus Christ. To him belongs the glory and the power forever and ever. Amen."

Starting in September and continuing all the way through to Advent, we will be exploring what it means to steward the manifold grace of God. God's abundant grace comes to us in so many ways and in many forms. Various topics we will explore together include stewarding our God-given time, spiritual gifts, and work. We will consider how we might become better stewards of our minds, our bodies, our relationships, creation, and – yes – even our money!

In addition to preaching on passages of Scripture that focus on these gifts, the preaching team will provide discussion questions each week for you to dig deeper. The central purpose of these questions is to resource Community Groups to facilitate conversations on the weekly theme and passage. Not every group will track with the series, but our hope is that some will. The questions will be made available to anyone who wants them.

We are really excited about this series. Our hope is that it will expand our vision of what it means to be a disciple of Jesus Christ. Our prayer is that, as we learn to be good stewards of God's abundant grace, as we serve one another with whatever gift we have received, that God would be glorified in all things through Jesus Christ!

Parish Retreat:

Ascension's 40th Parish Retreat is upcoming September 29 – October 1. Since 1982, except for 2020 (and we won't mention what happened then), Ascension has been gathering annually at Laurelville Church Center, about 50 minutes east of Pittsburgh, to enjoy a weekend of teaching and fellowship. The weekend is a great way for newcomers to connect. It's an all-ages event with special programming for children and youth, as well as plenty of outdoor activities, prayer ministry, campfires, walks in the woods, and an annual ducky race. Registration opened in August and closes on Sunday, September 17. In 2022 approximately 350 people attended at some point over the weekend.

We are once more offering significantly subsidized rates on food and accommodation. In addition to general subsidies, we offer scholarships so that financing the weekend is not a barrier to anyone. Participants are welcome to come for the entire weekend and stay overnight. There are about seventy rooms with ensuite bathrooms and many other types of accommodation with shared bathrooms. If you don't want to stay overnight, coming for a day trip is possible too – either Saturday or Sunday. We hope to use as much of the great Western Pennsylvania outdoor space as we can. If it's a cooler weekend, please bring your woolies because we hope to have the garage-style doors of our main meeting space as open as possible for maximum air flow.

We have an incredibly winsome speaker this year – the Rt. Rev. Drew Williams (that means he's a Bishop). Bishop Drew comes from New England but is also a Brit – they're everywhere! He is passionate for Christians to understand the Fatherhood of God in the very depths of their being. What did Jesus mean when he repeatedly referred to God as his Father? What does that mean for us? Many of us have a vague uneasiness with God – why is that and can we begin to think differently, and perhaps feel differently, as well? We look forward to Bishop Drew unpacking this more for us in ways that are highly personal.

We hope you will consider coming. A preview video of the retreat with footage taken last year is on our website (News & Events). As mentioned, registration began in August. We encourage online registration whenever possible, and online payment via Easy Tithe. An information table will also be available on Sundays. 

Refugee Ministry

am blown away by the warm reception that Church of the Ascension has shown to our first two official Co-Sponsorship families! Hello Neighbor, our partner resettlement agency, also calls this program "Welcome Circles" so you may hear me use both terms.

Family #1 (mom, dad and 4 children) arrived on May 12th and continues to adjust to life in Beechview in the apartment which we outfitted. At the time of this writing, the mom and oldest son have started working at a restaurant in Mt. Lebanon, and most of the adults have passed their learners' permit test. The children are nervously excited about starting school this fall, and the boys are hoping to join the soccer team. Our Welcome Circle volunteers have provided indispensable support in many tangible and intangible ways. To give just a few of many examples I could list, one couple from the team visited to set up a wi-fi router and ended up staying to play a soccer video game. Another volunteer visited regularly to teach basic yard and garden maintenance and play board games. We provided in-home English tutoring twice a week through June and July. The family has met some other Syrians and are growing more independent with grocery shopping and transportation, and we will continue to be consistent, encouraging American friends.

Family #2 (mom, dad and 7 children) arrived on June 20th to their home in Perry North which was furnished by our team. Their transition is progressing slowly. There have been several hurdles in obtaining their basic identification documents, and there are many surprises and disappointments in the process of enrolling for school and finding work. The younger children love shopping for snacks at Aldi and the older children are happy for any opportunity to meet new friends and explore Pittsburgh. They regularly express gratitude for our team and have said "Without you, we would be strangers in Pittsburgh."


Hello Neighbor limits the size of each Welcome Circle to 15 people to protect the families from being overwhelmed, but there are plenty of ways for all of us at Ascension to care for these families and others like them as we seek to build a sustainable refugee ministry! Let me mention a few:

• **Contribute to the Food Barrel!** Your food donations will be shared with our two refugee co-sponsorship families over the next few months. Non-perishable "gleanings" from your food pantry or grocery shopping (pasta, flour, sugar, salt, cooking oil) and Mediterranean specialties will help in their transition toward financial stability. A few favorites are dried fruit, pistachios, almonds, canned corn, tomatoes, mushrooms, dark olive oil, and red and brown lentils.

- Other Donations! Our team will share other needs for donations as they arise. Our hope is to work with the families to address ongoing needs, leveraging connections with their Syrian friends in Pittsburgh and our church community.
- Help with Graphic Design! We are developing a brochure to help promote the Refugee Ministry within Ascension and even to other local churches. We could use a volunteer with graphic design skills. Please send me an email if you have time to help!
- Come to the Legacy Luncheon on Nov. 16! People of all ages are welcome to attend. Members of our team will be sharing stories from our Welcome Circles journey and what we are learning about the lives of refugees in Pittsburgh. More details to come!
- **Prepare to join a Welcome Circle!** We hope to gather another Welcome Circle of 15 people to receive another family before the end of 2023. If you are interested in training to become part of a team, let me know (email above).

International Ministry Highlights





he International Ministry was active this past summer. We take a break from regular classes and add special seminars, Bible studies and lots of field trips. This provides needed rest for our volunteers and different opportunities for internationals, and a way for new students in the summer to join in. Highlights of the summer include: A Tour of Amish Country, a Pronunciation class, an Advanced Writing Class, a month-long Conversation Café, several Bible Studies, a six-week Career Class, Lawn Bowling, stargazing at the Pittsburgh Observatory, a visit to the Carrie Furnace, attending Elizabeth Ames' wedding, and July 4th Festivities including a Picnic in the courtyard and

Fireworks. We have several internationals who have joined us regularly for Sunday worship throughout the summer, and we hope they continue into the fall.

Will you pray for us? Prayer is the backbone and life blood of all that we do. We need the Holy Spirit's guidance and help. On our broadest roster our ministry encompasses about 300 internationals, including those in classes, those with conversation partners, those who join us for field trips, those who attend festivities, and those who we stay in touch with but who have moved from Pittsburgh. Teachers have visited former students on both the East and West Coasts of the U.S.

Will you pray for us as we prepare for the fall? Testing for fall classes has been ongoing every Monday night. August and September are incredibly busy months as new teachers are recruited and students are tested and placed into classes. It is easy for the leadership of this ministry to feel overwhelmed. We know that we need to seek God's face. We do recognize that without Him we can do nothing. May all find the grace of the Lord and may we launch with peace and good cheer!



Will you pray for our teachers? Lead Teachers, Assistant Teachers, and other Volunteers will have EFL teacher training on Wednesday evenings, September 6 and 13.

Will you pray for our fall semester of classes? They begin on Monday and Wednesday, September 18 and 20. We have morning and evening classes with different levels offered at different times.

Will you pray for childcare workers? We offer childcare for our classes, and this requires a small team of workers. Please pray for good workers and for safety for the children.

Will you pray for assistants for the Bible studies that are beginning? Students will have the option of participating in one of several Bible studies on Wednesday morning or Thursday evening. We may also host a Sunday study at 12:30 pm that meets in a home.


Will you pray for field trips and specifically that friendships form between Ascensionites and Internationals? We hope to attend a CMU Virtual Reality Cultural Center. We also hope to travel to the Oglebay Resort in West Virginia to hike, wall climb, ride a tram, enjoy a pool, and visit the zoo. 
End of Summer Soul Care

Praise & Prayer: A Weekly Email Ministry of Intercession

Throughout the course of a week, we receive prayer requests and thanksgivings from a variety of sources – Sunday's written prayer requests, through the website, via phone calls, etc. Our team of intercessors, the people who pray for those requests, pray for those joys and needs as they are compiled into a confidential email. (We include in this email requests from those who have indicated they want prayer support.)

This weekly email includes the first name and last initial of the person making the request (or the one in need of prayer) along with a brief recap of the praise report or the challenge being faced. Sometimes folks prefer to be included in this ministry anonymously, so we are happy to use generic language (like a man, a woman, a child) to honor their wishes.

These emails provide a way of "rejoicing with those who rejoice" as individuals thank God for his many blessings – health, family, friends, employment, etc. It is also a way of "bearing one another's burdens" as individuals invite additional prayer support during difficult times like grief, sickness, family crisis, unemployment, addiction, discernment, etc. If you would like to know more about our Praise & Prayer ministry, please contact me (email above).

Fearfully and Wonderfully Made

For this issue James, a young adult at Ascension who has non-speaking autism and communicates via a spelling board, interviews Ascension member Jude Blank who resides in a care home in Squirrel Hill.

> any of you might not recognize my next interviewee, Jude Blank. Jude has been in the church as long as I can remember. She was in the choir for years, always serving even when

her physical challenges made it hard. More recently, covid and health issues have kept her away from public worship. I hope that if you don't know her, you enjoy meeting her in this article. If you do know her, look her up and send her a card! Everyone needs cards.

James Scannell (JS): How did you come to Ascension?

Jude Blank: (JB): That's a fun story. I was going to Bellefield Presbyterian in 1994. I told the minister, "I am a charismatic Anglican, where should I go to church?" and he immediately recommended Ascension. I have been at Ascension ever since.

JS: How do you spend your days?

JB: My caregiver gets me up. I take meds and have therapy. Putting on compression stockings takes a while. Then I have lunch and we have group activities. I talk to my dad every day at 4:30 pm. In the evening I listen to Christian music or read scripture.

JS: I'm wondering how you experience God.

JB: I do "drop" prayers whenever I hear something is going on. I've had miracles happen - there was a time when I could not walk and the Lord said, "Get up and walk" and go to Bible study. And I got up and walked and went to Bible study! I pray for people all over the place – when I'm at my desk, when I'm in the shower, anywhere I am.

JS: What helps you belong in community?

JB: I'm in an Ascension community group.

JS: I want to know more about how you hear God.

JB: That's a good question James. I hear God in many ways but mostly I hear God through my heart, through my writing, and through my art.

JS: I'm curious about your art and how it helps you connect with God.

JB: Oh well I'm glad you asked! I thought you might ask so I brought my art. I write haikus. For instance, this is based off of Acts 1. (You are allowed to add an extra syllable in the haiku if it goes along with what the theme is).

Party central Jesus Upper room be there with me Cry laugh pray kneel to me

JS: I like it.

JB: Thank you.

JS: I'd like to know if you do visual art.

JB: Yes, I do visual art. I haven't done visual art in a long time. I have boards and markers and my easel right by my desk and I can do it there.

JS: I'm so interested in that. I love how we can connect with God in so many ways.

JB: Absolutely.

JS: I'm curious about whether you avoid the word "disabled".

JB: Yes, I avoid the word "disabled."

JS: Tell me more.

JB: Because I don't like it. I am an able-bodied person. I have to sit outside of God's world sometimes and I have to sit outside of my own plans - "Man makes plans and God laughs." But I can still do my art. I can still talk with friends





like you. I can still Facetime people and go to my Ascension community group. Although I can't go to church, I watch it online if I can.

JS: Do you have another term you like for those who need extra support?

JB: I'm glad you asked that. I don't like "disabled" because I am an able-bodied person. But I like "physically challenged".

JS: Interesting. What would you use then for someone like me?

JB: We both have neurological problems.

JS: Yes, there is no good vocabulary that isn't unwieldy. Examples: Autistic people don't like the labels "high functioning" or "severe" or "profound" autism. I like "motor challenges" or "sensory challenges" or "nonspeaking" but these descriptors get clunky. I love it that you see all your strengths and focus on what you can do.

JS: I'd like to know who supports you.

JB: Well, my brother Michael supports me. My dad Steve supports me. The community here at Weinburg Terrace, my care home, supports me - especially the nurses.

JS: Does the church support you?

JB: I'm glad you asked. The church does support me. And I know that is something you wanted me to tell you about. I feel like they could do more for me. If they would bring me communion - one of the priests or a lay eucharistic minister. And if someone would bring me the bulletin. And visits because I am not allowed to go out because of health reasons.

JS: I think it is wonderful that you are open with people about what you need. We can't get what we need without asking.
