Letter from the Rector

Rebuilding...

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The long winter of the global pandemic is thawing. Signs of spring are everywhere. As we rejoice at the sight of leaves on the trees and the smell of cut grass, I am reminded of God's promise to Noah after the great flood: "As long as the earth endures, seedtime and harvest, cold and heat, summer and winter, day and night, shall not cease" (Genesis 8:22).

Many of us have prayed the appointed collect, "In the Time of Any Common Plague or Sickness" (from the 1662 BCP), as part of Morning Prayer for more than a year. I invite you now to join me in giving thanks to God for the provision of effective vaccines and improved treatments. As we honor those in the medical and scientific communities for their extraordinary work, as Christians we also give thanks and praise to God who is the Lord our Provider.

After the flood, God said to Noah: "Go out of the ark... be fruitful and multiply" (Genesis 8:16-17). Likewise, after the pandemic, we are to come out of our isolation and be fruitful and multiply – though in a different way! Our task is to be harbingers of the Good News of Jesus as we share Christ's healing with a broken world. Then it is God who produces the fruit, and we get to see the multiplication of those coming to faith in Him.

After the resurrection and before his Ascension Jesus commissioned his disciples (that includes us) to "Go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you. And remember, I am with you always, to the ends of the age" (Matthew 28:19-20). These are our marching orders!

After the exile of the people of Israel in Old Testament times, God called upon Ezra and Nehemiah to rebuild the walls of Jerusalem and rebuild the temple. We hope and pray that the worst of the pandemic ravages and restrictions will recede so we can resume life together. The challenge before us now, like God's people returning from exile, is to rebuild. Rebuilding in our context may need to happen in a variety of ways. I want to address just three.

1. Rebuilding Our Relationships

The past year has strained many relationships – in our nation, in families, even in our church family. The stresses and strains of politics, pandemic, racial tensions and violence have taken a toll on so many lives. Let these things not keep us apart. Rather, as I shared in church on the Second Sunday of Easter, may we heed these words:

“Let us hold fast to the confession of our hope without wavering, for he who has promised is faithful. And let us consider how to provoke one another to love and good deeds, not neglecting to meet together, as is the habit of some, but encouraging one another, and all the more as you see the Day approaching.” Hebrews 10:23-25

I am reminded that our hope as Christians is not in politics or programs, but in the risen Lord Jesus Christ who loved the world so much that he gave his life for us. Our God is faithful. We have seen his faithfulness again and again. Whereas it is so easy to provoke one another in negative ways, the author of this letter to the Hebrews exhorts us “to provoke one another to love and good deeds... encouraging one another.” Eugene Peterson, in *The Message*, puts it this way: “Let’s see how inventive we can be in encouraging love and helping out... spurring each other on” (Hebrews 10:24-25).

- Do you have repair work to do in a relationship in your family or at church? If so, I urge you not to delay. Pray for the one(s) with whom there is any brokenness, then seek to be reconciled.
- How might you encourage someone this week? Think of one or two individuals and pray for them, then send a note, speak a word of kindness, offer to help out, etc.

2. Rebuilding Good Habits

The restrictions and forced separations of the past season have been hard. For many months most of our congregation has had to participate in worship remotely. Many people are eager and excited to be able to be back together again in person. And yet, I also know a few folks who have confessed to this being quite hard to do. We have become used to a leisurely Sunday morning routine, with church on YouTube, a coffee in hand – all from a comfy couch!

The writer to the Hebrews, however, warns against, “neglecting to meet together, as is the habit of some.” Surely, now is the time for us to rebuild good habits as we make being in church together week-by-week a top priority.

- I wonder, what other good habits do we need to be cultivating post-pandemic? In addition to healthy habits around exercise and eating, let us also press into good rhythms and routines of silence, solitude and prayer.

3. Rebuilding Ascension’s Stones

Work on our buildings has continued throughout the pandemic. The exterior masonry cleaning and repointing, the refinishing of the Nave floors, and I hope by the time this is printed, the installation of the new pews, will all be completed. Such amazing progress!

Yet ahead of us lies a bigger and more challenging rebuilding project. We will be to expanding the Parish Hall, creating new restrooms and improving our buildings so that they may better serve our mission and calling to welcome our neighbors and reach the nations with the saving love of Christ. This has been the underlying theme of our *More Than Stones* campaign.

The architects are working hard with a team from Ascension to develop the plans that were presented in August 2019. In the coming months we are hoping to finish the capital campaign. I am excited to continue casting the vision and working with teams of parishioners to complete the task of visiting every household. We plan to invite each person to participate in this project. Of the projected costs of \$8.2 million, \$5 million has been pledged from members and friends of our church family, and a further \$2 million allocated from our Endowment Fund. This leaves us with \$1.2 million more to raise.

When the people of Israel returned from exile, the task of rebuilding the temple and the walls of Jerusalem seemed daunting. Yet each family played their part as they came together to rebuild the walls stone by stone. Each person worked and gave in thanksgiving because they trusted in the Lord.

- If you have not yet made a pledge to our *More Than Stones* campaign (perhaps you are new to Ascension and have not yet been asked), will you begin prayerfully to consider how much you might give?
- If you have fallen behind in your giving or have not yet started to give to the campaign, can you get back on track? We are happy to help if you have any questions or concerns.
- Will you continue to work and pray for the completion of this rebuilding project at Ascension?

I close with words of encouragement from the prophet Isaiah, as we embark upon the rebuilding of our relationships, good habits, and the completion of the More than Stones project:

“The Lord is the everlasting God, the Creator of the ends of the earth.

He does not faint or grow weary; his understanding is unsearchable...

those who wait for the Lord shall renew their strength, they shall mount up with wings like eagles, they shall run and not be weary, they shall walk and not faint.”
Isaiah 40:28-31

A Vista..New Life in Christ

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Years ago, when I was brand new to my position as Parish Administrator, Jonathan Millard walked into my office and asked if I had recruited a boat bearer for our upcoming All Saints Service. I smiled and told him “I’m working on it.” He left my office. I immediately began ‘to work on it’, went to my computer and googled “boat bearer”. Not a cradle Anglican and relatively light in my liturgical preferences, I had absolutely no idea what he was talking about. I have since learned what a boat bearer is, and in fact that role has since been renamed to ‘incense bearer’, someone who accompanies our ‘thurifer’ (I had to learn that term too) on festive days when we use incense around the altar. And good news – we did have a ‘boat bearer’ on that Sunday and have had at every All Saints Service since!

In my various roles at the church over the years I have scheduled many boat bearers. Indeed, I have been one of a few responsible to schedule many people for roles of all types – chalice bearers, readers, intercessors, counters, ushers, greeters, welcome table hosts, hospitality hour hosts, counters, security personnel, altar guild, prayer ministry. Each of these ministries is core to making our Sunday Services work and all have experienced challenge during the pandemic. Some ministries have been completely dormant for over a year and we face the task of rebuilding.

This past month I have sent emails and made calls to resurrect usher and greeter teams for our 9am, 10am and 11am services. This is detailed, nitty-gritty, in-the-trenches kind of work. It does not have a lot of glory to it. I pull up my lists – do we have people to greet this Sunday? My colleagues Andrea and Stacey are

doing the same thing in their zones – do we have readers, intercessors, altar guild team members, a complete tech team? It’s ‘small stuff’ that turns into ‘big stuff’ when we don’t have the right personnel in place on Sundays.

I like Vistas – a beautiful view from a high place. I go on a walk most days along a pathway that provides a vista of the valley below and the sky beyond. In the morning I see the sun rise. I sometimes see the fog burn off in the valley below. In the evening it’s all about the moon and the stars. My walk is beautiful and gives me a daily reminder of the big picture within which I live and move.

On Easter Sunday morning I witnessed another Vista - a joy-filled scene as we celebrated our life together in Christ with baptisms. It was a big picture moment - a beautiful view from a high place. I worshipped at the 9am outdoor tent service where baby Vivian and elementary-aged Zechariah were baptized. What joy was present! What a sight to see Vivian lifted high after her baptism. What a moment to witness Zechariah plunged beneath the cold waters of baptism and brought up again alive in Christ!

This was a renewing Vista moment for me. It was a reminder of why I do what I do in the ins and outs of my everyday work life. It gives me energy to go about the nitty-gritty work of rebuilding our Sunday ministries. It gives me a reason to pick up that phone. And, hopefully, it gives those who participate in these ministries a vision of their role within the whole of the story.

New life in Christ – let the rebuilding begin!



Upholding Core Values in Children's Ministry

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I remember being seven years-old and seated at the Rodemann's dining room table. It was a table adorned with china, silver and crystal and our family had just finished enjoying our first course of Sunday lunch. Very suddenly, Mrs. Rodemann, who was seated at the head of the table, blurted out in a powerful voice, "I'm bored with talking about church politics. Let's change the subject!"

Being surprised to hear a grown up use the word "bored," I was jolted out of what could only be described as a state of being mesmerized. I certainly was not bored. I had been holding a silver spoon an inch away from my eyes so that I could see the patterns of my eyeballs in the curved reflection of the spoon; my eyes appearing small and then big and then bigger as I moved the spoon back and forth across my refectation. That little game had so captured my attention that I had lost all sense of time, and the adult goings-on of a Sunday lunch.

Mrs. Rodemann's declaration didn't just jolt me out of a mesmerized state, it caused our entire company, which included my parents and three siblings, as well as Mrs. Rodemann and her family, to look afresh at who might shift our conversation. My older sister then looked to me, noticed what I was doing, and half laughingly said, "look at what Catherine is doing with her spoon."

I felt caught and then embarrassed. I quickly put my spoon down next to my plate. Without missing a beat my younger brother picked up his spoon and tried to see his reflection in it. My parents responded quickly, "Jon, put that down, that is not how we behave at the table."

The conversation turned back Mrs. Rodemann who announced, "let's talk about women's liberation."

This small memory remains with me all these years later. There were values being taught that day. Behaving well when being hosted by church members was a value my parents held as a clergy family. And they used our daily gathering at the dinner table as an opportunity to teach certain values. For example, while eating a meal we learned that we could:

- *love our neighbor* by keeping our hands to ourselves,
- *be grateful* by saying *thank you* to God and to whomever



prepared each meal,

- *take care of our bodies* by eating all of our vegetables daily rather than the more desired ice cream that was occasionally served as a treat.
- *be polite* by including the word please when asking for the salt or the pepper.

A well-balanced delicious meal accompanied with pleasurable conversation with loving people brings deep satisfaction to our hearts and flourishing to our lives. Being intentional to cultivate lifegiving values in our neighborhoods, church or in our children's ministry program brings a taste of heaven.

As we enter a new season of being able to worship in person and rebuild our children's ministry on our church campus it's a great time to highlight some the core values we uphold. Some of the staple ingredients of our values include, offering grace to each other, being kind, attentive and prudent and having an appreciation for beauty all with a robust dash of fun!




Music & Worship Arts

Against the ‘Rule of Thumb’ - Worshipers Made Resilient!

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When you step into a new role, particularly when it is a leadership role, the rule of thumb is that you don't make any changes for 18 months. It is best to keep things the same and take the time to develop relationships and build trust, so that when you do need to make changes, you have some relational capital saved up.

The COVID pandemic did not give Elise and me this luxury. We stepped into our new roles in music and worship arts in June of 2019. Less than a year later, we were having to pull the plug on various initiatives that we were trying to start or working to sustain. The music team was reduced to a barebones operation, leading songs to an empty nave so they could be recorded for a live streamed service. The desire for artists of various disciplines to join in fellowship was relegated entirely to Zoom. My first official act as choir director was to suspend practices, and the choir itself went from a vibrant ensemble of more than thirty voices to a group of committed volunteers lending their voices to a virtual choir.

More than a year has passed, and things are on the move. By the time you read this, choir rehearsals will have relaunched,

albeit with various precautions in place – we are singing outside and masked. The music team is gradually returning to something of its former energy, still recording for the live stream, but leading (and singing!) in person at the outdoor tent services. And, while worship artists continue to gather online, plans are being hatched for in-person gatherings and opportunities to see, hear, and engage with what Ascension's artists have been working on during this season. It is not back to normal, but it is being rebuilt, and it is inevitably being rebuilt into something different than what it had been.

There is an urgency that I hear in people's voices, a desperation to share and serve, a deeply felt need to worship together, and it is subtly but noticeably different from what I have heard in the past. My prayer is that God would rebuild this ministry into what He wants it to be—a vibrant community of unashamed worshippers, using the gifts of art and music to glorify the triune God, made resilient by the lessons of the past. Please join us.

1. Luncheon fellowship to provide recognition, warmth, intellectual stimulation and fun to our senior church family
2. Outreach to attract new seniors to our church
3. Education, worship, and prayer to enrich our trust in Jesus Christ

OWLS luncheon meetings will be held the second Thursday of every month beginning May 13. These meetings are the ideal time and place to invite your friends, many of whom need love and hope. Invite them to "come and see" what we have to offer them. Each meeting will begin with fellowship as we share a delicious hot lunch at a bargain price of \$15. The first time a new person arrives lunch is on us!



While our programming is not yet firmly set for the coming year, we foresee a festive Strawberry & Cream Celebration of Summer, a Texas BBQ, learning about the Lives of Saints, discussions about Racial Reconciliation, and a fuller understanding of our Jewish Roots. Music will be integrated into each meeting as we give thanks for all our blessings.

Beginning in the fall there will be an additional OWLS meeting on the fourth Thursday of every month. This meeting will be a Bible study for those interested in going deeper. More on this at a later date!



We did not want to cancel our program this year, but we just could not imagine what a year would look like with so many changes.

God answered our prayers. Doors opened to ministries that we had not engaged with before. We mourned that we could not sit and eat with our houseless friends, but stepped into a new food pantry ministry in our Northside neighborhood. We mourned that we could not enter Pittsburgh Public Schools to come alongside kindergartners learning their letters, but we rejoiced at a new opportunity to assist those same students with their distance learning. We mourned that we would not be able to travel to Thailand, but doors opened for a deeply formative service opportunity in Eastern Kentucky.

It would be easy to say that we had to rebuild our ministry this year, but the truth of the matter is that God did the rebuilding. He built Agape Year 4.0 into something far better than we could have asked or imagined. It has not always been what we would have wanted or expected. And it has not always been easy, or what I would describe as good. But why settle for good when God is ready to do so much more!? Our rebuilt year has stretched our imaginations and taken us into a place of greater trust in Him.

We are witnesses to His care. We are witnesses to His provision. We are witnesses to His imaginative rebuilding work in us. Ask us about it! We would love to share our story.

In some ways, Zoom provided a surprisingly intimate setting to learn about each other. Even for a family that struggled with Zoom, God provided a unique connection to the church and a new, miraculous communication pathway. But at this moment, I think I am beginning to understand more of the reality that we are Christ's body – whatever the circumstance. I have experienced in a new way that blessing each other is real! Our Friends with special needs are really good at blessing! God's spirit was with us, even on Zoom! And listening to God's Word with our Friends was both grounding and groundbreaking: we imagined the Holy Family as loving and imperfect caregivers, the search for the Pearl of Great Price as wonderful as the search for seashells and much more!

As we re-enter our more typical church setting, my prayer is that we retain the sense of "*sitting with great delight in God's shadow,*" knowing that God is inviting all of us to his banquet table! Please pray with me:

- That we will be creative in maintaining our fellowship, even as people begin to go to different services or churches again
- Zoom allowed us to partner with family and paid caregivers in a new way. Please pray that these new relationships will be a blessing to all caregivers who might find attending church difficult.
- For the continued integration of people with special needs into our church family

Ben Avon/North Hills

Leader: Jeanne Kohn (jeanne.kohn@ascensionpittsburgh.org)

When: Bi-monthly weekends, men/women's prayer meetings, alternate weeks, both groups together twice a month. Have moved in COVID to meeting only for prayer and support. Very stretched parents so this is a gift to the parents.

Description: Our group meets for a simple meal, Bible study, family worship (Compline), and fellowship and prayer one Friday night and one Sunday night a month. This is a very kid-friendly group, and many families have children who attend the middle-school or high school youth group while the group meets. Younger children play in a different part of the house while the adults study scripture and pray. In addition, once a month the men and women meet separately for prayer, men on the first Sunday of the month, women on the third Sunday.



Community of St. Andrew - Morningside

Leaders: Chris Massa (chris.massa@gmail.com) and Elise Massa (elise.massa@gmail.com)

When: Bi-monthly Tuesdays, men/women's accountability alternate weeks, both groups once a month

Description: Our group is focused on introducing and practicing Anglican spiritual disciplines. Members agree to a communal rule of life (a holistic pattern of Spirit-filled practices to deepen one's faith in shared community) and make a year-long commitment to the group. Guests can visit the group prior to commitment. This cell meets the first and third Tuesday evenings of the month, with discipleship groups meeting on the other Tuesdays (2nd - men, 4th - women) for all St. Andrew members. While we are discussing how best to resume in-person meetings, our group currently uses Zoom for all gatherings in addition to Slack for various conversation topics. As an entire community, we have bi-weekly movie/game nights and celebrate the Anglican feast days!


